- March 12th - Governor Kemp's Executive Order closed schools
- All instruction was delivered online.
- April 1st - Governor Kemp's Executive order closed schools for the remainder of the year
- Planning began to prepare for 2020-21 school year.

Planning Priorities



1. Multiple contingencies to ensure the health, safety, and well-being of students, staff and visitors.
2. Operational and instructional protocols in a COVID-19 world.
3. Curriculum and scheduling.
4. Addition of K-3 Chromebooks, hotspots, wifi boosters.
5. Personalized individual needs of students and staff members.
6. Professional learning in a variety of topics including trauma-informed school practitioners credentialing.
7. Digital lesson plans for nine weeks of instruction for a variety of contingencies, including the Empower online option.

Health and Safety for Students and Staff



Protective Gear (PPE)

Cloth Face Coverings	Two per employee One per student
Disposable Masks	Available at all schools and facilities
Face Shields	Provide one for each employee

Other Safety Equipment and Supplies

Temporal Thermometers	Minimum of 4 for elementary, 5 for middle and 10 for high 1 for each Special Education Self-Contained Classroom
Plexiglass Shields- Free standing counter shields are being provided to schools as necessary	All locations
Plexiglass Screens for Temperature Stations	175 have been procured for use at all CCSS schools.
Hand-sanitizing stations	Over 500 for the district (distributed based on size of school)
Cleaning supplies	Wipes, personal hand sanitizers, medical grade gloves, spray bottles, medical grade disinfectant A456 (available in schools and on buses)



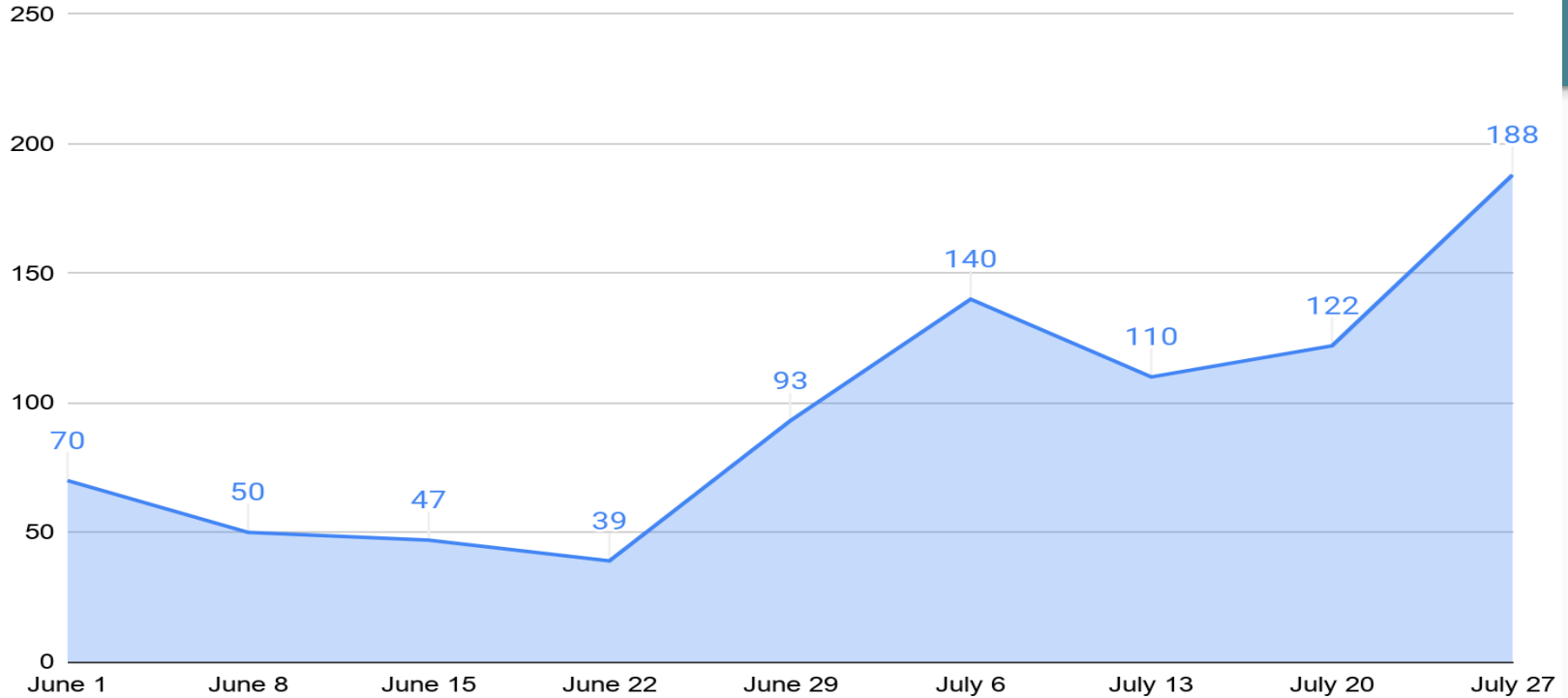

Coweta County is currently in the substantial uncontrolled community transmission category according to Department of Public Health data. Substantial uncontrolled community transmission is defined as “greater than 100 cases per 100,000 residents”. On June 29th Coweta was still in the Moderate High community transmission category with 93 cases. On Monday, July 27th Coweta’s number of cases per 100,000 residents was 188 cases.



LISTENING TO THE DATA



CDC Guidelines 7/23/20

“If there is substantial, uncontrolled transmission, schools should work closely with local health officials to make decisions on whether to maintain school operations. The health, safety, and wellbeing of students, teachers, staff and their families is the most important consideration in determining whether school closure is a necessary step. Communities can support schools staying open by implementing strategies that decrease a community’s level of transmission. However, if community transmission levels cannot be decreased, school closure is an important consideration. Plans for virtual learning should be in place in the event of a school closure.”

STARTING THE SCHOOL YEAR



- The Superintendent recommends that the Coweta County School System start the 2020-2021 school year with virtual/remote instruction for all students through at least September 4, 2020. Public Health data and conditions will be reassessed by the Superintendent in late August to determine if it is safe to resume face to face instruction for students on September 8, 2020.
- In the event that conditions allow, a hybrid option may be considered for implementation at that time so that face to face instruction can safely resume.
- Teachers and employees will report to work on their regularly scheduled reporting date.

COWETA COUNTY SCHOOL SYSTEM TIMELINE APPROACH

July 27 - July 30	Analysis of data, continued communication with health agencies (Data indicates mid-August peak)

Aug. 13	Students begin virtually - all students will utilize the Empower model

What will online instruction look like?

- Students will be able to take the courses that they were scheduled for as if they were in a face-to-face model.
- Students will be assigned to a Coweta classroom teacher that teaches at their assigned school.
- Students will remain connected to their base schools.
- A student's daily schedule will resemble the schedule that they would follow when they return to face-to-face instruction. Students will receive direct instruction which will also be recorded for viewing later if needed. Students will receive assignments that they will complete on their own.
- Students who receive specialized supports will continue to have these opportunities.

How would a hybrid model be implemented?



PreK - 5th

- Preference is to return PreK-5 back to face-to-face as soon as conditions allow
- If necessary, students could be divided by first letter of last name and attend school on a weekly AB schedule (K-5)

6th - 12th grade

- If necessary, students could be divided by first letter of last name and attend school on a weekly AB schedule

How will face to face look?

Face coverings

Require face coverings on all school buses. Require face coverings while inside CCSS schools and facilities where physical distancing is not practical.



Exceptions:

- Eating and drinking
- Exercising
- Health condition
- Communication impairment or disability which prevents an individual from wearing a face covering.
- Students under 2nd Grade
- Under supervision and guidance of staff member

Social Distancing

Reduced class size numbers by students participating in online learning.

- Markings in hallways and restrooms
- Desks arranged for distance
- Reduce numbers in cafeteria (eat in classrooms, staggered schedules, etc.)



Sanitizing Procedures

- Frequent opportunities for handwashing
- Frequent classroom cleaning
- Hand sanitizing stations
- Additional cleaning supplies provided for classrooms and schools



Health & Wellness

- Random temperature screenings for students
- Water fountains have been closed, and students are encouraged to bring water bottles from home
- School nurses will be trained on protocols and procedures to deal with COVID symptoms
- Follow public health guidance
- Limiting non-essential visitors
- Post signage throughout campuses
- Increase hygiene education



Empower Virtual Online Option - Will remain after transition to face-to-face as a continuing option. Registration for Empower will reopen July 31.
