**RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING SEPTEMBER AS ATTENDANCE
AWARENESS MONTH**

Whereas, regular school attendance is essential for academic success and is a strong predictor of student achievement, graduation, and post-secondary readiness;

Whereas, chronic absenteeism, defined as missing 10% or more of school days for any reason—including excused, unexcused, and disciplinary absences—places students at serious academic risk;

Whereas, data from school districts across California and the nation show that chronic absenteeism disproportionately affects students of color, students experiencing poverty, foster youth, homeless youth, English learners, and students with disabilities, contributing to persistent opportunity and achievement gaps;

Whereas, the California Education Code (§48200 et seq.) mandates compulsory school attendance and requires school districts to monitor and support student attendance to ensure access to educational opportunities for all students;

Whereas, the Santa Rosa City School District Board Policy and Administrative Regulation 5113.1 emphasizes that promoting regular attendance is a shared responsibility of schools, families, and the broader community, and calls for proactive and culturally responsive approaches to address chronic absenteeism;

Whereas, the federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) requires state and local education agencies to track and report chronic absenteeism as an indicator of school quality and student success, and to take meaningful action where disparities exist;

Whereas, Attendance Awareness Month each September offers an opportunity to increase public awareness about the importance of daily attendance and mobilize efforts to reduce chronic absenteeism across all grade levels;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Santa Rosa City School District Board of Education proclaims September as **Attendance Awareness Month** and commits to:

1. **Promoting Awareness:** Engaging students, families, educators, and the community in messaging campaigns that emphasize the importance of regular attendance and its connection to learning, graduation, and lifelong success.
2. **Addressing Disproportionality:** Analyzing and disaggregating attendance data by student group to identify and address racial, socioeconomic, and other disparities in absenteeism rates.
3. **Monitoring Progress:** Setting measurable goals, monitoring attendance data at the school and district level, and using data to drive decisions about interventions and supports.
4. **Implementing Effective Strategies:** Supporting site-level efforts to build a positive school climate, implement early warning systems, engage families, and remove systemic barriers to attendance.
5. **Collaborating with Stakeholders:** Partnering with families, community organizations, health agencies, and local government to address underlying causes of chronic absenteeism, including transportation, mental health, and housing instability.
6. **Celebrating Success:** Recognizing students, staff, and schools that demonstrate significant improvements or consistently strong attendance.

Be it further resolved that the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that strategies to reduce chronic absenteeism are embedded in district and school improvement plans, aligned with state and federal accountability requirements, and reported annually to the Board.

**RESOLUTION REGARDING THE EDUCATION PROTECTION ACCOUNT
RESOLUTION NO. 2025/26-05**

WHEREAS, the voters approved Proposition 30 on November 6, 2012;

WHEREAS, Proposition 30 added Article XIII, Section 36 to the California Constitution effective November 7, 2012;

WHEREAS, the provisions of Article XIII, Section 36(e) create in the state General Fund an Education Protection Account to receive and disburse the revenues derived from the incremental increases in taxes imposed by Article XIII, Section 36 (f);

WHEREAS, the Director of Finance shall estimate the total amount of additional revenues, less refunds that will be derived from the incremental increases in tax rates pursuant to Article XIII, Section 36(f) that will be available for transfer into the Education Protection Account during the next fiscal year;

WHEREAS, if the sum determined by the State Controller is positive, the State Controller shall transfer the amount calculated into the Education Protection Account within ten days preceding the end of the fiscal year;

WHEREAS, all monies in the Education Protection Account are hereby continuously appropriated for the support of school districts, county offices of education, charter schools and community college districts;

WHEREAS, monies deposited in the Education Protection Account shall not be used to pay any costs incurred by the Legislature, the Governor or any agency of state government;

WHEREAS, a community college district, county office of education, school district, or charter school shall have the sole authority to determine how the monies received from the Education Protection Account are spent in the school or schools within its jurisdiction;

WHEREAS, the governing board of the district shall make the spending determinations with respect to monies received from the Education Protection Account in open session of a public meeting of the governing board;

WHEREAS, the monies received from the Education Protection Account shall not be used for salaries or benefits for administrators or any other administrative cost;

WHEREAS, each community college district, county office of education, school district and charter school shall annually publish on its Internet website an accounting of how much money was received from the Education Protection Account and how that money was spent;

WHEREAS, the annual independent financial and compliance audit required of community college districts, county offices of education, school districts and charter schools shall ascertain and verify whether the funds provided from the Education Protection Account have been properly disbursed and expended as required by Article XIII, Section 36 of the California Constitution;

WHEREAS, expenses incurred by community college districts, county offices of education, school districts and charter schools to comply with the additional audit requirements of Article XIII, Section 36 may be paid with funding from the Education Protection Act and shall not be considered administrative costs for purposes of Article XIII, Section 36.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED:

1. The monies received from the Education Protection Account shall be spent as required by Article XIII, Section 36 and the spending determinations on how the money will be spent shall be made in open session of a public meeting of the governing board of Santa Rosa City School District;
2. In compliance with Article XIII, Section 36(e), with the California Constitution, the governing board of the Santa Rosa City School District has determined to spend the money received from the Education Protection Act as attached.

Resolution Recognizing October as Filipino American History Month

WHEREAS, Santa Rosa City Schools supports diversity and inclusion in education for K-12 public schools; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to instill in our youth the importance of education, history, and self-determination in creating eminent role models, in establishing a proud cultural identity, and producing exceptional citizens of this nation; and

WHEREAS, today, the Filipino American community is the second largest Asian American group in the United States, with an estimated population of 4,200,000 people, third largest Asian American group in California with the earliest documented evidence of Filipinos in the continental United States; and

WHEREAS, Filipino American History Month began in 1992, done in recognition of the contribution, culture and heritage that Filipino Americans brought to the United States from the Philippines when they arrived in October of 1587; and

WHEREAS, every October, many communities throughout the United States and its territories have celebrated this occasion, not only to commemorate the anniversary of the presence of the first Filipinos on US soil and to observe its heritage, but also to recognize the social, intellectual, and economic contributions of Filipinos and Filipino Americans in this country; and

WHEREAS, Filipino Americans, including the leadership of Larry Itliong (born October 25, 1913), who co-established the United Farm Workers (UFW), and Philip Vera Cruz (born December 25, 1905), who served as the second vice-president of the UFW, and were both active participants in the Delano Farmworkers Grape Strike and boycott in 1965, advocated for social justice in California and nationally in partnership with Hispanic/Latinx, Black/African American, Arab, and other Asian Americans; and

WHEREAS, efforts must continue to promote the study of Filipino American history and culture, so mandated in the mission statement of the Filipino American National Historical Society, because the role of Filipino Americans and those of other people of color have been overlooked in the writings, teachings and learning of United States history; and


WHEREAS, it is imperative for Filipino American youths to have positive role models and to instill in them the importance of education, complemented with the richness of their ethnicity and the values of their legacy; and

WHEREAS, California is home to over half of the Filipino population in the USA and the location of historic Filipino communities such as in Los Angeles, San Francisco, Stockton, Vallejo, Delano, San Diego


and Salinas among others; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Santa Rosa City Schools recognize October 2025 as Filipino American History Month.

Resolution Proclaiming October 13, 2025, As Indigenous Peoples' Day

WHEREAS, the Santa Rosa City Schools Board of Education ("Board") recognizes that the Indigenous Peoples of the lands that would later become known as the Americas have occupied these lands since time immemorial; and

WHEREAS, the Board values the many contributions made to our community through Indigenous Peoples' knowledge, labor, technology, science, philosophy, arts and the deep cultural contributions that have shaped our district; and

WHEREAS, the Board recognizes the fact that the Santa Rosa City Schools District is built upon the traditional homelands, villages and use areas of the Pomo of this region, without whom the building of the district would not be possible; and

WHEREAS, in part the District's mission is to recognize and value each student's individuality and our community's cultural wealth; and the Strategic Plan prioritizes grounding our work in a deep understanding of students' identities and the historical and cultural contexts in which we all operate; and

WHEREAS, the idea of Indigenous Peoples' Day was first proposed in 1977 by a delegation of Native Nations to the United Nations-sponsored International Conference on Discrimination Against Indigenous Populations in the Americas; and

WHEREAS, the United States federal government recognizes Columbus Day on the second Monday of October, in accordance with the federal holiday established in 1937; and

WHEREAS, in AB 2016, the California Legislature has found and declared that the implementation of various ethnic studies courses within California's curriculum that are A-G approved, with the objective of preparing pupils to be global citizens with an appreciation for the contributions of multiple cultures, will close the achievement gap, reduce pupil truancy, increase pupil enrollment, reduce dropout rates, and increase graduation rates.

WHEREAS, in AB 738, the California Legislature has found and declared that instructional materials that incorporate Native American history, culture, and sovereignty, contemporary issues of historic and modern Native Americans, and the relationship and place of historic and modern Native Americans in our diverse governmental, racial, and cultural communities will provide California's children with a more complete education and academic preparation to interact in today's world; and

WHEREAS, the Cloverdale Rancheria of Pomo Indians of California, Dry Creek Rancheria Band of Pomo Indians, Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria, Kashia Band of Pomo Indians of the Stewarts Point Rancheria, Koi Nation of Northern California, and Lytton Band of Pomo Indians, and Mishewal Wappo Indians of Alexander Valley are tribal nations with roots in Sonoma County.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Santa Rosa City Schools District Board of Education recognize October 12th as Indigenous Peoples' Day and take steps toward publishing this day in official district materials; and

THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the District shall celebrate Indigenous Peoples' Day on the second Monday of October as a day used to reflect upon the ongoing struggles of Indigenous people on this land, and to celebrate the thriving culture and value that Miwok, Pomo, Wappo and other Indigenous nations and people add to our District and County ; and

THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, in honor of Indigenous Peoples' Day, the District shall commit to invite the Cloverdale Rancheria of Pomo Indians of California, Dry Creek Rancheria Band of Pomo Indians, Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria, Kashia Band of Pomo Indians of the Stewarts Point Rancheria, Koi Nation of Northern California, and Lytton Band of Pomo Indians, and Mishewal Wappo Indians of Alexander Valley to participate in providing input towards the development of a localized Native American studies model curriculum.

PASSED AND ADOPTED by the following vote of the Governing Board of Santa Rosa City Schools, County of Sonoma, State of California, on August 27, 2025.

Resolution Recognizing September 15 to October 15, 2025, as Latinx Heritage Month

WHEREAS, the Latinx community has a long and important history of commitment to our Nation's core values, and the contributions of this community have helped make our country great;

WHEREAS, the United States Congress approved Public Law 90-498 in 1968 to designate the week of September 15th as "National Hispanic Heritage Week";

WHEREAS, in 1988 the United States Congress passed Public Law 100-402 which amended Pub. L. 90-498 and established "National Hispanic Heritage Month";

WHEREAS, the term "Hispanic" both celebrates the colonization and erases African and indigenous roots of the peoples of Latin America;

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa City Schools works to create a culture of belonging in our school community;

WHEREAS, the terms to use to define people's individual and collective identities are both personal and institutional choices;

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa City Schools chooses to utilize Latinx or Latine - terms that reflects the diversity in the individuals in our community who have Latin American roots - in this resolution and invites community conversation around these choices;

WHEREAS, the Latinx population in the United States is projected to grow to 107,000,000 people by 2065, at which point the Latinx population will comprise more than 24 percent of the total population of the United States;

WHEREAS, in 2018, there were more than 18,701,184 Latinx children under 18 years of age in the United States, which represents approximately $\frac{1}{3}$ of the total Latinx population in the United States;

WHEREAS, nationwide, Latinxs cast approx. 16.6 million votes in 2020, an increase of 30.9% over the 2016 presidential election;

WHEREAS, the number of eligible Latinx voters is expected to rise to 40,000,000 by 2030, accounting for 40 percent of the growth in the eligible electorate in the United States by 2032;

WHEREAS, in the 2020 Census, the Latinx population accounted for 28.3% of the total population in Sonoma County;

WHEREAS, understanding Latinx history and culture is an important part of celebrating Latinx Heritage Month;

WHEREAS, the September-October period covers a wide range of Independence Days for the Latin American countries of Central America, South America, the Caribbean and Mexico;

WHEREAS, Latinx Heritage Month celebrates the history and culture of the nation's Latinxs and acknowledges their influence on politics, the economy, and the social and cultural life throughout the United States;

WHEREAS, throughout our history, Latinx Americans have enriched the American way of life, and we recognize the millions of Latinx Americans whose love of family, hard work, and community have helped unite us as a people and sustain us as a Nation;

WHEREAS, as entrepreneurs and public servants, scholars and artists, Latinx Americans have provided wisdom, energy, and leadership to our communities, and to our country;

WHEREAS, the California State Board of Education recognized in its Multicultural Education Policy that each student needs an opportunity to understand the common humanity underlying all people; and

WHEREAS, school psychologists are on the front lines in the drive for violence prevention, intervention and response in our schools; and


WHEREAS, school psychologists are leaders in delivering mental health services to students; and

Resolution Proclaiming October As LGBTQIA+ History Month

WHEREAS, Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer/Questioning, Intersex, Asexual, plus all other identities not encompassed in the acronym (LGBTQIA+) History Month, founded in 1994 by Missouri high-school history teacher Rodney Wilson, is an annual month-long observance of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender history, and the history of the gay rights and related civil rights movements; and

WHEREAS, the month of October was selected to coincide with National Coming Out Day, October 11, which celebrates the anniversary of the first march on Washington for gay and lesbian rights in 1979; and

WHEREAS, the LGBTQIA+ History Month is meant to highlight and celebrate the history and achievements of lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender people; and

WHEREAS, according to Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation ("GLAAD"), "during the early years, the celebration was largely marked by a call to action and commemoration ... but since then, LGBT History Month has blossomed into a national coordinated effort to highlight exemplary role models from the LGBT(QIA+) community"; and

WHEREAS, LGBTQIA+ History Month commemorates the impact that the LGBTQIA+ community has had on local, national, and international history; honors members of the LGBTQIA+ community who have been lost to hate crimes and HIV/AIDS; and

WHEREAS, LGBTQIA+ students experience high rates of bullying, victimization, and harassment at school on the basis of their actual or perceived sexual orientation or gender identity, or that of their associates; and

WHEREAS, this bullying, victimization, and harassment has led to negative educational outcomes for LGBTQIA+ students, including higher rates of dropping out, higher rates of absenteeism, and lower postsecondary school aspirations; and

WHEREAS, LGBTQIA+ students also report higher rates of anxiety and depression; and

WHEREAS, school-age years are a critical time for LGBTQIA+ youth as they often "come out" or disclose their LGBTQIA+ identities to others during that time; and

WHEREAS, creating a welcoming and safe school environment for our LGBTQIA+ students, staff, families, and caregivers makes our school community more welcoming and safe to all; and

WHEREAS, the District supports education that celebrates our different identities; integrity in how we treat others; and courage to do what's right by listening to, learning from, and respecting diverse viewpoints; and

WHEREAS, there are many reasons why LGBTQIA+ History Month is important, including the following reasons: to remember those across the world who live without rights; to learn about historic LGBTQIA+ figures and events; to remember how far we have come in the fight for equality; to teach LGBTQIA+ youth about the generosity and resiliency of the LGBTQIA+ community, as well as the ability to stand up and achieve what they believe in; and

WHEREAS, during the last decade, our country has made tremendous strides in the LGBTQIA+ equality movement, including legalizing gay marriage nationwide, electing LGBTQIA+ elected officials on local, state, and federal levels; and

WHEREAS, celebrating LGBTQIA+ History Month is particularly important now as the LGBTQIA+ community is once again being targeted by a slew of homophobic and transphobic bills introduced and adopted across the country; and


WHEREAS, this year we must reflect not only on the progress that has been made in the national and global effort to advance human rights, but also on the specific challenges that remain for members of LGBTQIA+ communities in the U.S. and around the world; and

WHEREAS, Santa Rosa City Schools is committed to recognizing and honoring the LGBTQIA+ community, including supporting and encouraging a dialogue that promotes equality, dignity, and human rights for all; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Governing Board of the Santa Rosa City Schools District hereby designates the month of October 2025, as LGBTQIA+ History Month.

WHEREAS, by working together as educators, families, students, and community members, we can create a culture of care that prioritizes mental health, reduces stigma, and ensures that every student knows they are valued and supported;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Santa Rosa City Schools Board of Education hereby proclaims September 2025 as **SUICIDE PREVENTION MONTH** throughout our school district; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we encourage all schools, staff, students, families, and community partners to:

**RESOLUTION REGARDING THE EDUCATION PROTECTION ACCOUNT
RESOLUTION NO. 2025/26-05**

WHEREAS, the voters approved Proposition 30 on November 6, 2012;

WHEREAS, Proposition 30 added Article XIII, Section 36 to the California Constitution effective November 7, 2012;

WHEREAS, the provisions of Article XIII, Section 36(e) create in the state General Fund an Education Protection Account to receive and disburse the revenues derived from the incremental increases in taxes imposed by Article XIII, Section 36 (f);

WHEREAS, the Director of Finance shall estimate the total amount of additional revenues, less refunds that will be derived from the incremental increases in tax rates pursuant to Article XIII, Section 36(f) that will be available for transfer into the Education Protection Account during the next fiscal year;

WHEREAS, if the sum determined by the State Controller is positive, the State Controller shall transfer the amount calculated into the Education Protection Account within ten days preceding the end of the fiscal year;

WHEREAS, all monies in the Education Protection Account are hereby continuously appropriated for the support of school districts, county offices of education, charter schools and community college districts;

WHEREAS, monies deposited in the Education Protection Account shall not be used to pay any costs incurred by the Legislature, the Governor or any agency of state government;

WHEREAS, a community college district, county office of education, school district, or charter school shall have the sole authority to determine how the monies received from the Education Protection Account are spent in the school or schools within its jurisdiction;

WHEREAS, the governing board of the district shall make the spending determinations with respect to monies received from the Education Protection Account in open session of a public meeting of the governing board;

WHEREAS, the monies received from the Education Protection Account shall not be used for salaries or benefits for administrators or any other administrative cost;

WHEREAS, each community college district, county office of education, school district and charter school shall annually publish on its Internet website an accounting of how much money was received from the Education Protection Account and how that money was spent;

WHEREAS, the annual independent financial and compliance audit required of community college districts, county offices of education, school districts and charter schools shall ascertain and verify whether the funds provided from the Education Protection Account have been properly disbursed and expended as required by Article XIII, Section 36 of the California Constitution;

WHEREAS, expenses incurred by community college districts, county offices of education, school districts and charter schools to comply with the additional audit requirements of Article XIII, Section 36 may be paid with funding from the Education Protection Act and shall not be considered administrative costs for purposes of Article XIII, Section 36.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED:

1. The monies received from the Education Protection Account shall be spent as required by Article XIII, Section 36 and the spending determinations on how the money will be spent shall be made in open session of a public meeting of the governing board of Santa Rosa City School District;
2. In compliance with Article XIII, Section 36(e), with the California Constitution, the governing board of the Santa Rosa City School District has determined to spend the money received from the Education Protection Act as attached.
