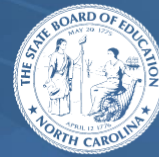

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Reporting Obligations

- 115C-269.35(b) The State Board shall require all recognized EPPs to submit annual performance reports.
- 115C-269.50 The State Board shall make the report cards available to the public through the State Board's Internet Web site on an annual basis beginning December 15, 2019, and shall submit the report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee annually by that date.

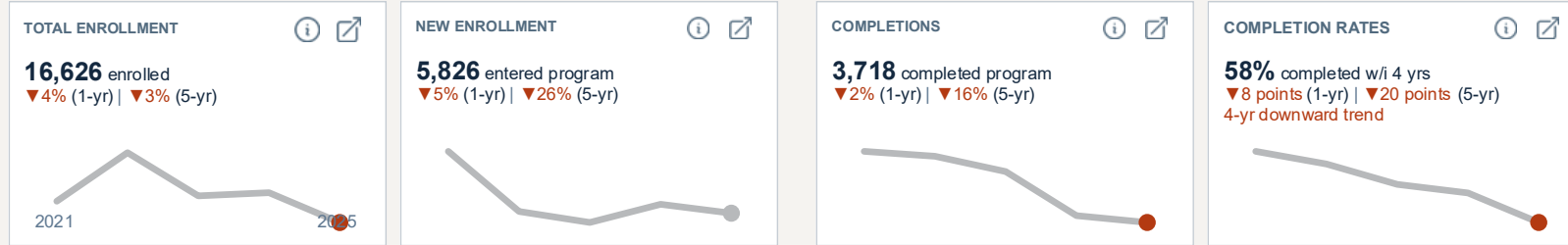

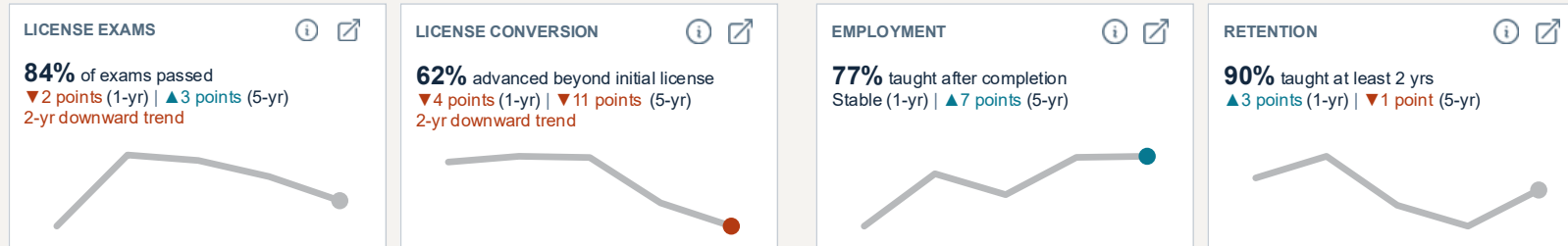

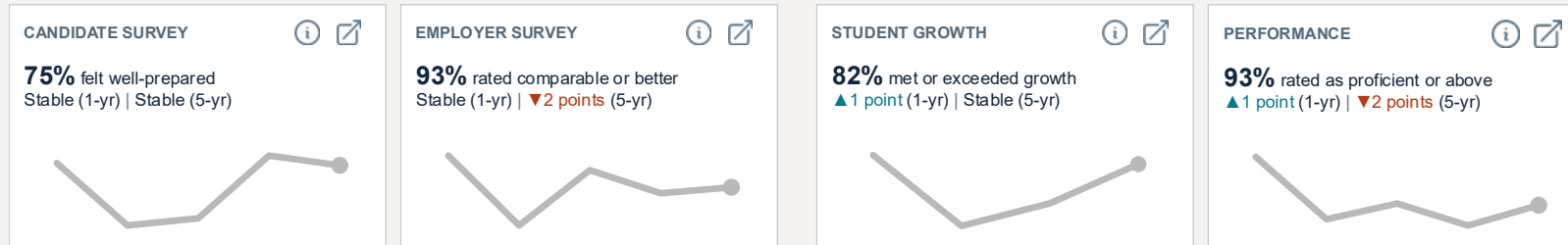

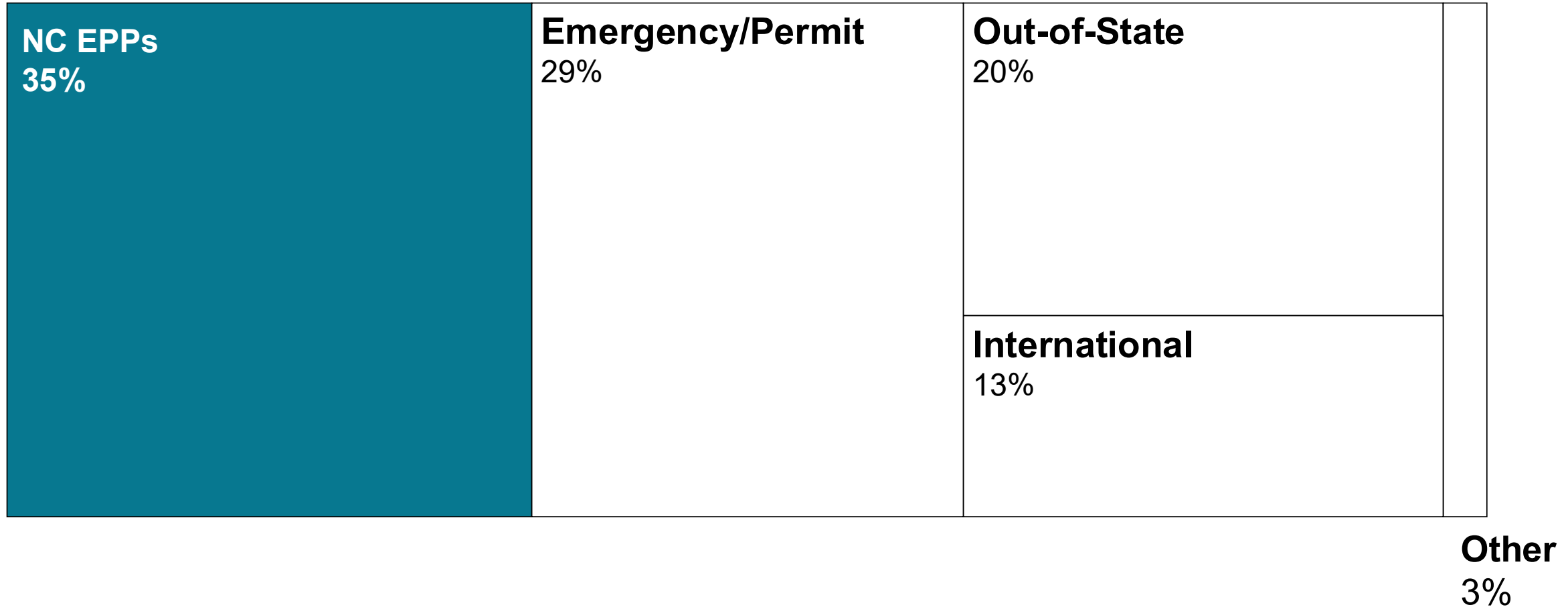

Fewer first-year teachers received training from NC educator preparation programs

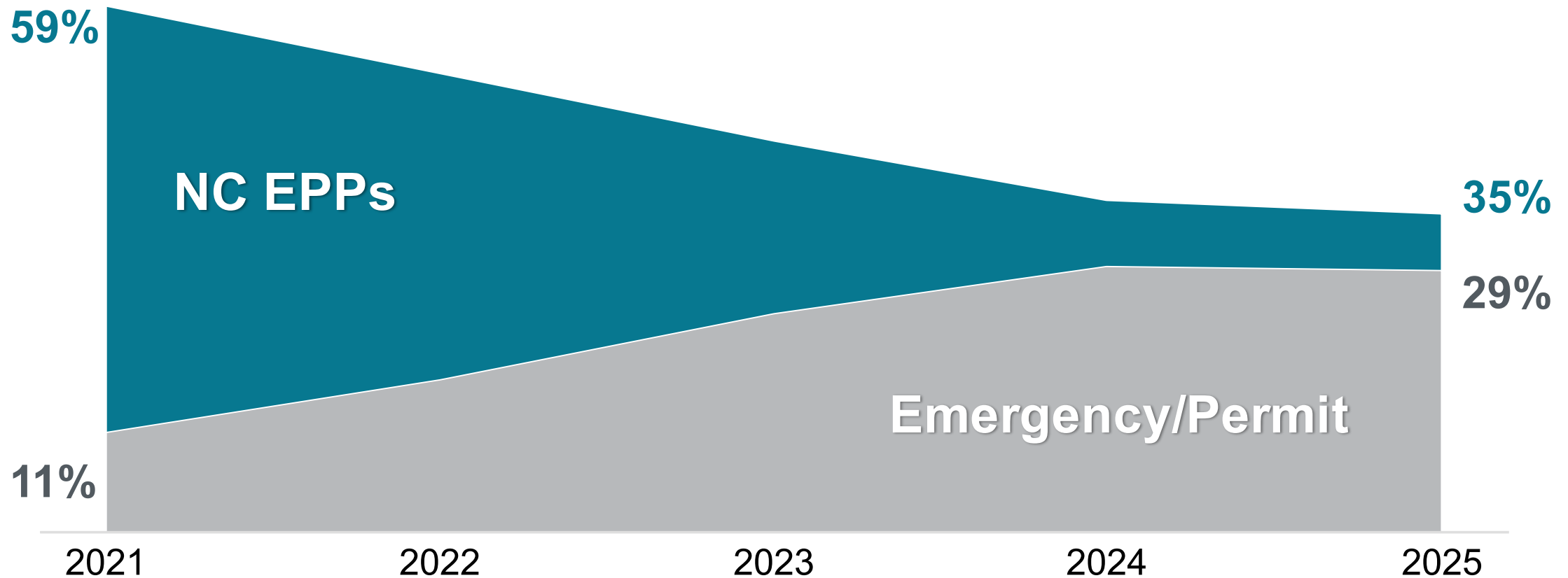
An update from last year's report



35% of first-year teachers in 2025 received training in NC EPPs



As fewer first-year teachers come from NC EPPs, more come through emergency/permit licenses.

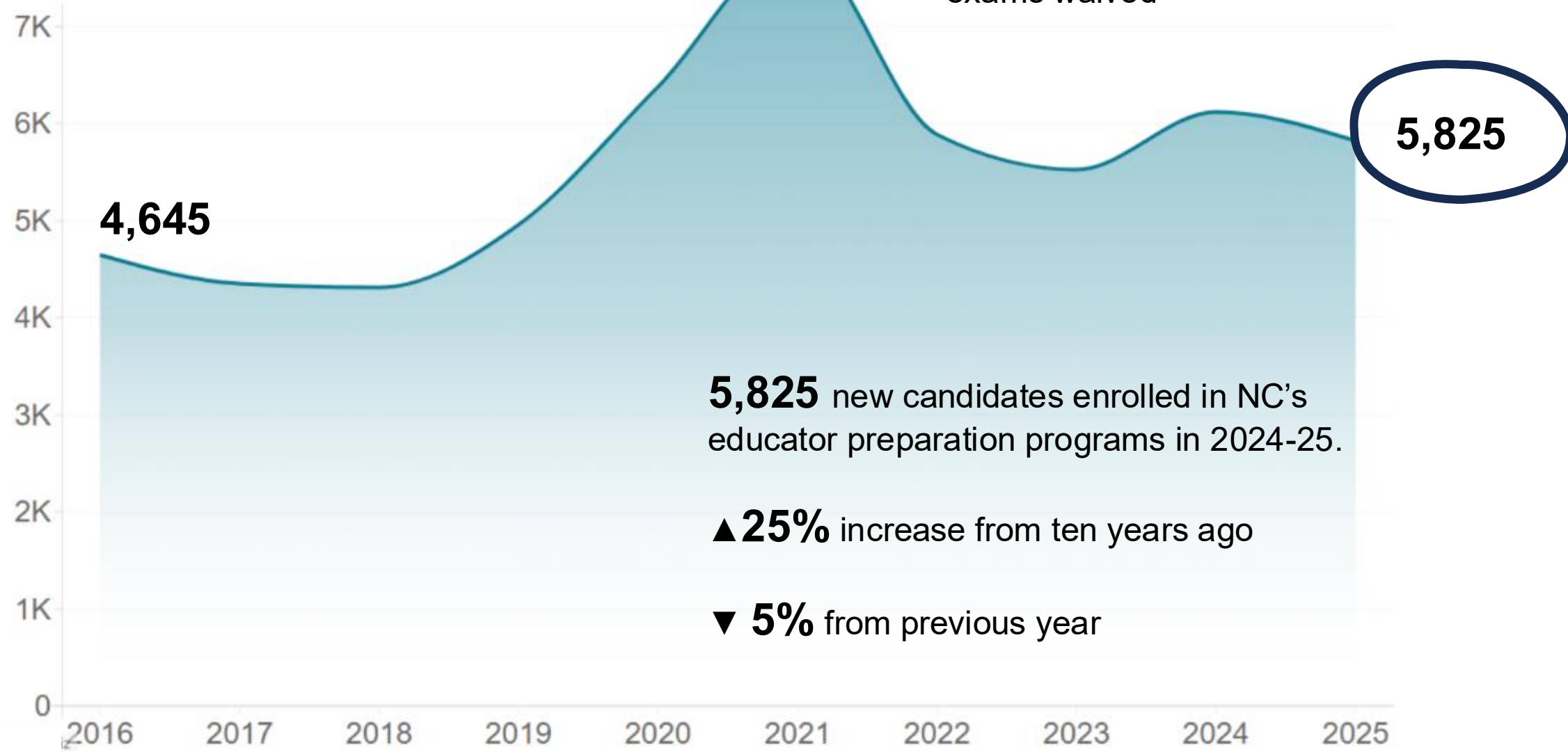

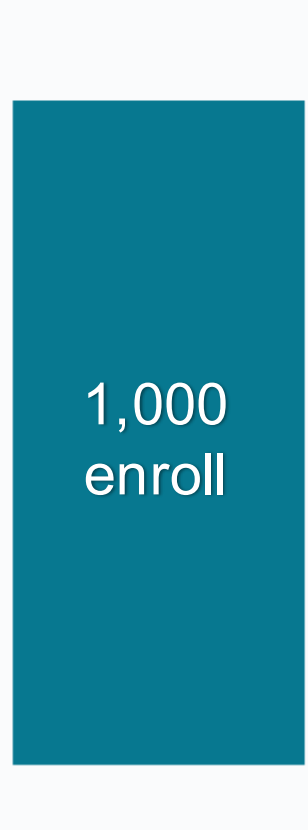
Entering Educator Preparation

What happens after candidates enroll?

For every 1,000 new enrollees in NC Educator Preparation Programs...

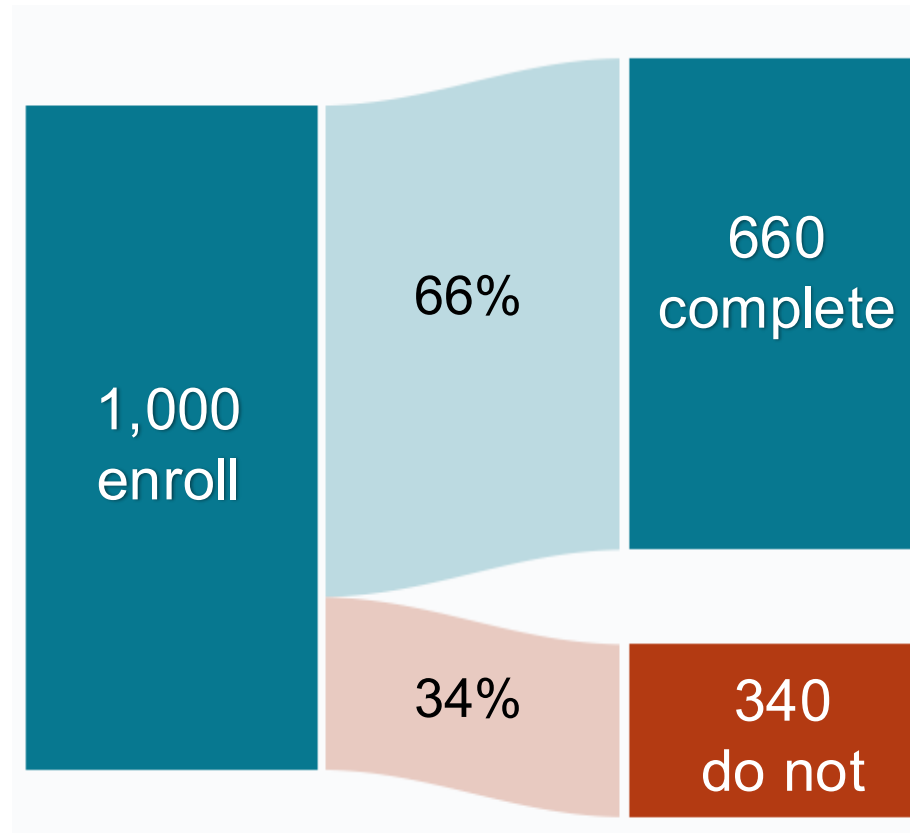

Imagine a cohort of 1,000 students who enter NC educator preparation programs in a given year.

What happens after candidates enroll?

For every 1,000 new enrollees in NC Educator Preparation Programs...

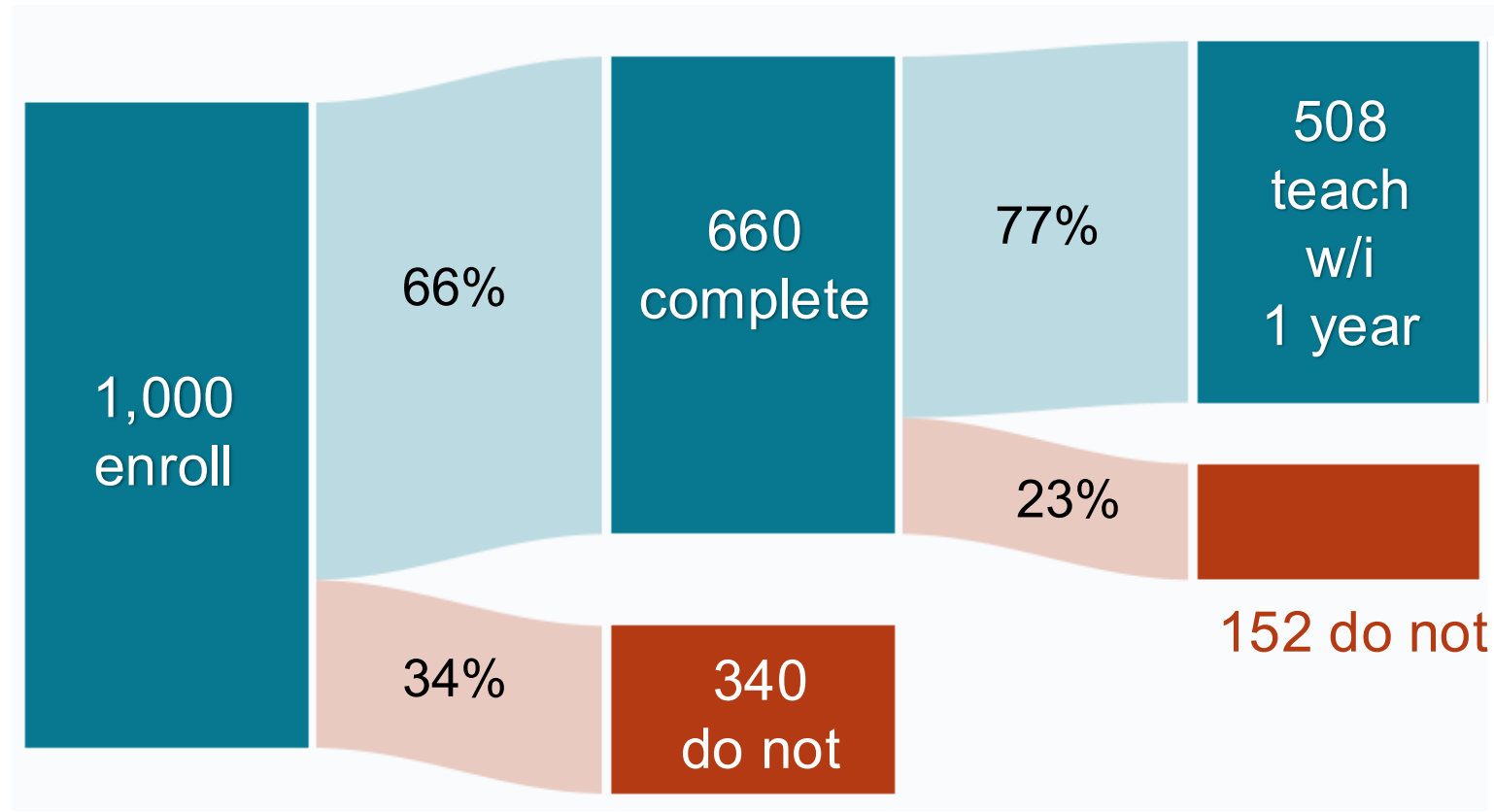


Roughly **66%** of the enrollees usually complete the program.

This leaves NC
1000 → **660** candidates.

What happens after candidates enroll?

For every 1,000 new enrollees in NC Educator Preparation Programs...



Roughly **77%** of the completers will teach w/i 1 yr.

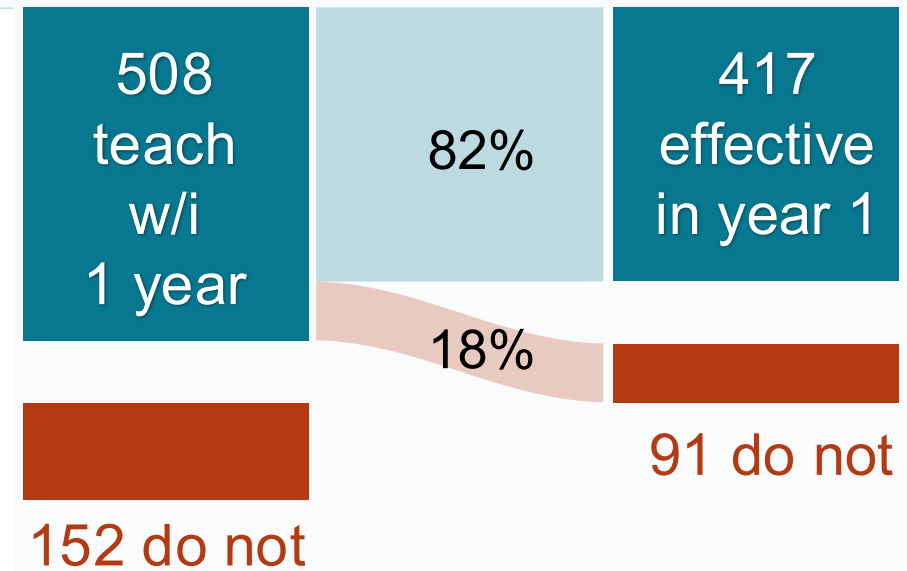
This leaves NC
1000 → 660 → **508**
first-year teachers.

What happens after candidates enroll?

For every 1,000 new enrollees in NC Educator Preparation Programs...

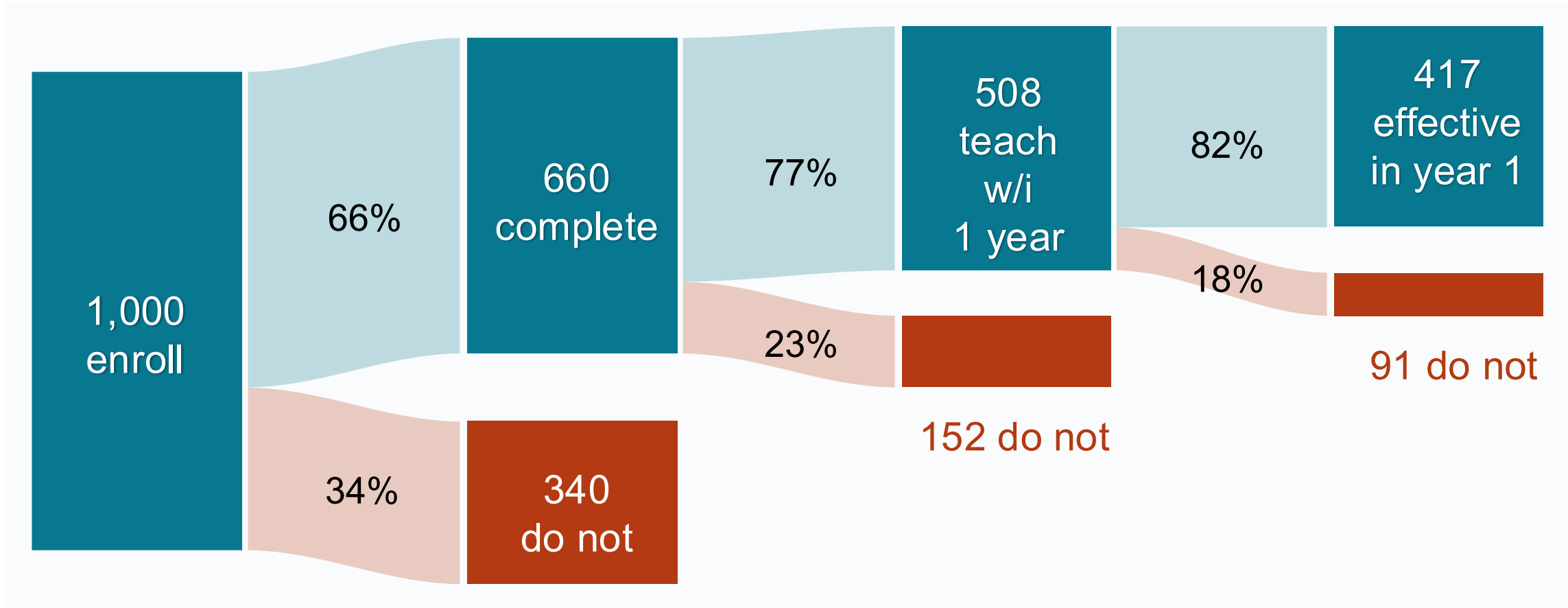
Roughly **82%** of those who teach within their first year of completion teach effectively.

This leaves NC
1000 → 660 → 508 → **417**
effective first-year teachers.



What happens after candidates enroll?

For every 1,000 new enrollees in NC Educator Preparation Programs...



With roughly **40%** of NC's EPP enrollees:

1. **Completing** the program AND
2. **Teaching** the following year in a NC school AND
3. Teaching **effectively** the first year

to replace those who are leaving?

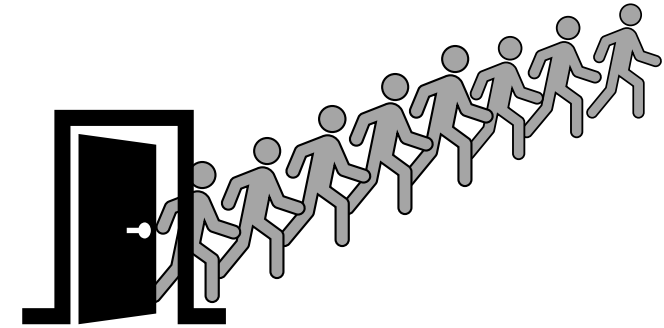

In 2025, for every..

5 prospective teachers who enter NC EPPs,

2 will complete program and teach effectively in first year, and

8 current teachers will leave the profession.



In the next presentation, Dr. Tom Tomberlin will show how NC relies on **additional pipelines**, outside of NC's EPPs, to replace exiting teachers.
