Helping Dragons Plan Their Next Chapter: Erin Stoll Selected as SGHS rootEd Advisor

Ste. Genevieve High School has been selected to participate in the expanded rootEd Missouri Career Advising Initiative (MCAI), a statewide effort to ensure rural high school students have access to a dedicated college and career advisor to support their success after graduation. We are excited to announce that Ms. Erin Stoll was chosen for the role of rootEd advisor, a position she has embraced with enthusiasm this school year.

rootEd advisors provide all seniors with one-on-one career and college advising to ensure they graduate on a path to a well-paying job—whether through college, career training, apprenticeships, or military service. As part of the initiative, rootEd advisors also partner with the local business community to help introduce students to in-demand career paths, including those close to home.

A proud 2002 graduate of SGHS, Ms. Stoll holds an associate degree from Jefferson College, a bachelor's degree in secondary education—health and physical education—from Southeast Missouri State University (SEMO), a master's degree in counseling from Missouri Baptist University, and a specialist degree in teacher leadership from SEMO. She began her career in 2008 at Sullivan High School as both an in-school suspension instructor and a physical education teacher, later joining Ste.

Genevieve Middle School as an ISS instructor and eventually serving in the SOAR/At-Risk program. Throughout her career, Ms. Stoll has been active in professional organizations such as the National Education Association, Missouri National Education Association, Missouri Alternative Educators Network, and Missouri School Counselors Association. Her work has been recognized with multiple SGMS Teacher of the Month awards and the 2025 SGMS Teacher of the Year honor.

“I hope our students know how lucky they are to be surrounded by so many wonderful people who just want the best for them,” Ms. Stoll said. “My door is always open and I’m here to help in any way that I can.” Her favorite quote, by educator Rita Pierson, sums up her approach: “Every child deserves a champion – an adult who will never give up on them, who understands the power of connection and insists that they become the best that they can possibly be.”

For Ms. Stoll, stepping into the rootEd role felt like a natural next step. “When this position came open, there was no question I was going to apply. I loved my job at SGMS, but when I decided to get my master’s in counseling, college and career planning was the component that excited me most,” she explained. “This position is exactly what I wanted and could see myself doing for the rest of my career. I’ve loved talking with students about their futures and helping them navigate what comes next. Our one-on-one meetings have been going great, and I’m excited to continue learning about their goals and supporting their process.”

In this new role, Ms. Stoll works individually with students to:

- Explore careers and apply for college or training programs that support their path;
- Navigate financial aid opportunities, including FAFSA completion;
- Enroll in college or career training, earn a workplace credential, and/or enlist in the military; and
- Successfully transitioned from high school, which may include help with housing, transportation, and other needs.

Ms. Stoll also appreciates the collaboration with the counseling team and school staff. “Working alongside our senior counselor, Mr. Toombs has been incredible. He’s a wealth of information and has been so generous with his knowledge,” she said. “Mrs. Sulkowski, Dr. Draper, and Ms. Brumfield has also been wonderful. I’ve been able to incorporate new ideas while maintaining the integrity of what was already in place. We have some exciting things coming up, and I can’t wait to share them.”

Her previous experience in the At-Risk/SOAR program also prepared her for this role. “That position taught me how important it is to build relationships—especially with students who may be

unmotivated,” she reflected. “Relationships will always be key to success when you’re working with kids. The more they can trust you, the better the outcome.”

As part of MCAI, Ms. Stoll will receive ongoing training, data insights, and operational guidance from rootEd Missouri. “We’re thrilled to bring rootEd Missouri’s proven model to our students,” Superintendent Dr. Paul Taylor said. “Our students deserve every opportunity, and rootEd’s dedicated advising—in partnership with our school and the local community—will make a real difference in setting up their future successes.”

Transportation Department Earns Fleet Excellence Award from Missouri State Highway Patrol

Schools Celebrate Red Ribbon Week

Schools in Ste. Genevieve County celebrated Red Ribbon Week the week of Oct. 27. This year's theme was "Life is a Puzzle, Solve it Drug-Free." Throughout the week, students of all ages participated in activities promoting healthy decisions and substance-free lifestyles.

Students from Ste. Genevieve High School gathered at Ste. Genevieve City Hall on Oct. 14 to sign a Proclamation declaring Oct. 27–31 as Red Ribbon Week in Ste. Genevieve County.

High school students attended a ThinkFirst assembly featuring guest speaker Carey Portell, who shared her powerful story of surviving a serious vehicle crash caused by another driver's choices. Through her message, she urged students to make responsible decisions and consider how their actions can impact others. The district extends its appreciation to Carey for taking the time to speak with students and for using her experience to inspire safer decision-making. Members of the high school organization Students Against Destructive Decisions (SADD) assisted in the planning and programming of the assembly, as well as other components of Red Ribbon Week.

Middle school students also participated in hands-on learning experiences throughout the week. Sixth graders discussed the effects and potential consequences of drinking alcohol at a young age, using Fatal Vision Goggles to simulate the difficulty of performing basic tasks while under the influence of alcohol. Seventh graders explored how opioids were originally developed for medical use but can quickly become dangerous due to their highly addictive nature. They also used simulation goggles to experience the challenges of impaired coordination. These activities were led in collaboration with School Resource Officers Christy Clark and Nick Cusanelli, helping students understand the real-world impact of substance use and the importance of making safe choices.

Teachers and staff shared lessons and discussions provided through Red Ribbon Week resources to make connections and learn about making healthy, drug-free choices. Younger students, including third grade classes, the Early Childhood Center, and preschools and daycares, had the opportunity to engage in presentations from the Ste. Genevieve Police Department and the Ste. Genevieve County Sheriff's Office, as well as local K-9 units. Students visited with School Resource Officer Nick Cusanelli, his retired K-9 partner, Mario, and Sergeant Charles Ochs. They talked with students about how an

officer and K-9 work as a team, and explained to older students how their K-9 partners are specially trained for police work, including certification in narcotic searches and apprehension.

Throughout the week, families and community members were also provided with resources such as the Operation Prevention Parent Toolkit, which offers tips and guidance for preventing drug use. These resources raise awareness and give families the tools to take a proactive approach in discussing the dangers of substance use with their children.

After our students spent weeks figuring out how to build their version of an efficient model bridge, they headed to Southeast Missouri State University's Academic Hall on Nov. 12 to compete. The MoDOT Bridge Building Competition challenges high school juniors and seniors to design and construct the most efficient model bridge using limited materials—balsa wood, thread and glue. The lightest bridges that carry the greatest loads are ultimately named the winners. “I’ve been here before and have an idea of what the winning bridges look like,” Mr. Rapp said. “I try to let my students design their bridges independently. It is always interesting to see what designs they come up with.”

Cash prizes for all awards were donated by BFW/Marcum Engineering and Consulting, Cape Area Engineers Club, Cape Noon Optimist Club, Missouri Society of Professional Engineers and Rotary Club of Southeast Missouri Service. MoDOT also partnered with Arkansas State University and the University of Missouri-Columbia to award one-time scholarships to the top contenders at their respective schools.

On Jan. 17, Ste. Genevieve High School's Dragons Robotics team competed in its first-ever high school VEX Robotics Competition V5 event, taking on the season's Push Back challenge and delivering an impressive debut performance.

Students designed, built and programmed their own robot to compete in a fast-paced, highly strategic environment. Matches required teams to form alliances with partner schools and compete against other alliances, balancing offensive and defensive strategies while adapting in real time. Students worked together to score points, block opposing teams and respond quickly to changing conditions on the field.

Beyond driving the robot during matches, Dragons Robotics students demonstrated advanced technical and problem-solving skills through multiple competition components. Team members coded their robot for autonomous operation, competed in skills challenges and maintained a detailed engineering notebook documenting their design process, troubleshooting and iterative improvements for scoring and evaluation.

Elcie Schweigert earned the Girl Scout Gold Award by creating and leading a community-wide Wellness Day designed to educate middle and high school students about the importance of mental, physical, and sexual health.

Elcie hosted her Wellness Day at the Ste. Genevieve R-II Elementary and Middle School gymnasiums, creating an informational and engaging experience for students and caregivers alike. The event brought together trusted community organizations and experts to ensure participants received credible, comprehensive information.

In addition to live presentations and resource tables, Elcie created and distributed educational handouts covering topics such as ADHD, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), anxiety, and depression. By connecting mental health with physical wellness and sexual health education, she emphasized how each area is interconnected and vital to overall well-being.

Understanding that stigma and discomfort often prevent youth from seeking help, Elcie intentionally designed the event to feel inviting and engaging. She promoted the Wellness Day through Facebook community groups, a Facebook local event page, and school communications including email, text alerts, and social media posts.

By addressing the root causes of limited awareness and stigma, Elcie's project not only provided immediate access to resources but also opened conversations that can positively influence students' futures. She hopes that by equipping young people with knowledge and normalizing conversations around wellness, they will grow into adults who prioritize their own health and model that openness for future generations.

"I believe that youth lack knowledge of the importance of mental, physical, and sexual health," said Elcie. "Mental health issues are often viewed as something to be embarrassed about. Even when resources exist, they are not talked about enough. I wanted to create an event that made information accessible in a way that felt welcoming, positive, and even fun."

Through her leadership, initiative, and commitment to community well-being, Elcie exemplifies the power of the Girl Scout Gold Award, and the impact one young leader can make.

SGHS rootEd Advisor, Students Participate in rootEd Day at the Capitol

On Feb. 10, Ste. Genevieve High School's rootEd advisor, Ms. Erin Stoll, along with seniors Bri Pfaff and Kyrah Kreidler, traveled to Jefferson City to participate in rootEd Day at the Capitol, highlighting the impact of dedicated college and career advising for rural students across Missouri.

The group began with a tour of the Missouri State Capitol, extending invitations to legislators to stop by the Rotunda to learn more about the rootEd Missouri Career Advising Initiative. They also sat in on the opening of the Missouri State Board of Education meeting, where they introduced themselves and shared where they were from.

Later in the day, rootEd advisors and students were recognized on the House Floor for their participation in the initiative. The SGHS representatives then met with the governor in his office and had the opportunity to connect with Rep. Mike Henderson to discuss the importance of continued support for rootEd.

During that meeting, Pfaff and Kreitler shared their personal experiences with the program, offering firsthand insight into how one-on-one advising has helped them clarify goals, navigate postsecondary options and prepare for life after graduation.

Ste. Genevieve High School was selected this school year to participate in the expanded rootEd Missouri Career Advising Initiative, a statewide effort designed to ensure rural high school students have access to a dedicated college and career advisor.

Through the initiative, Ms. Stoll provides individualized advising to all seniors, helping them:

- Explore career options and apply for college or training programs
- Complete financial aid processes, including FAFSA
- Enroll in college or career training, earn credentials or enlist in the military
- Successfully transition from high school, including assistance with housing, transportation and other post-graduation needs

rootEd advisors also partner with local businesses to introduce students to in-demand career pathways, including opportunities within their own communities.

SGHS Hosts First Alumni Health Care Panel

Ste. Genevieve High School recently hosted its first Alumni Health Care Panel, offering juniors and seniors a firsthand look at careers in the medical field through the experiences of local professionals. Good evening everyone—teachers, staff, family, friends, and the graduating Class of 2026.

It's an honor to stand here today as your valedictorian. Like a lot of us, I've spent the past few weeks thinking about everything that's happened over the last four years and what lessons I'll actually carry with me after graduation.

Surprisingly, one of the biggest lessons I learned came from running.

As some of you may know, I've been involved in cross country and track for the past six years. During most of that time, I liked the sport, but I never fully committed myself to it. I went to practice, ran races, and did what was expected, but I didn't always push myself as hard as I could have. Because of that, I didn't improve nearly as much as I wanted to.

Then, during my senior cross country season, I got injured and spent most of the season unable to compete. Watching from the sidelines gave me a lot of time to think, and I realized I was running out of opportunities to make the most of something I cared about.

So when track season started, I decided that if it was going to be my last season, I wasn't going to hold anything back.

I started eating better, training harder, running more outside of practice, and putting more effort into everything I was doing. Almost immediately, I started improving. My times dropped nearly every race, and for the first time in a long time, I felt like the work I was putting in was actually paying off.

One of the best moments of the season was placing second in the conference 4x800 meter relay with my teammates. It wasn't just exciting because of the result—it meant a lot because I knew how much effort had gone into getting there.

Then, right before districts, I broke my collarbone, and my season ended immediately.

At first, I was disappointed because I had hoped to compete with my team at districts and even sectionals. But after a while, I realized something important: even though the season ended early, I was still proud of it. I was proud because, for the first time, I felt like I had actually given my best effort.

What bothered me more was looking back at the previous years and realizing how much more I could have done if I had started taking things seriously sooner. Not because I would've won more races or medals, but because I know I left potential unexplored simply by not trying as hard as I could have.

I think that's something a lot of people experience, whether it's in sports, school, relationships, or anything else. Most regrets don't come from failing. They come from knowing you could have done more.

As we graduate, all of us are heading in different directions. Some people have everything planned out, and some people are still figuring things out. But no matter where we end up, we're all going to have opportunities in front of us, and eventually we'll have to decide how much effort we're willing to give.

My advice is simple: don't hold back.

Put effort into the things that matter to you. Take advantage of opportunities while you still have them. Don't wait until the end to find out what you were capable of all along.

Because even though my final season didn't end the way I wanted it to, it taught me something I'll remember for the rest of my life: it's easier to accept a result that didn't work out than to live with knowing full effort was never given.

And with that final note, I would like to thank Mr. Rapp for always brightening my day and adding some much-needed foosball, Dr. Boyd, Mr. Toombs, and Coach Boyd for always pushing me to work harder, Mrs. Uzzell for teaching not only about French, but a multitude of other subjects as well, and my family for always supporting me along the way.

They offer money for the 3 top prizes; \$150 for first, \$100 for second, and \$50 for third. First place, Caroline Roth of SG, earned the \$150 prize and moved onto the State Competition which takes place in July each year, she is the daughter of Derek and Katie Roth. Second place, Camille Melahn, daughter of Nick and Rachael Melahn. And Kaitlyn Jarvis, daughter of Brandy and Jeremy Henderson, placed 3rd.

VFW Auxiliary Young American Patriotic 3D Art Contest

This was year 4 of the 3D category. Alivia Bays, daughter of Ashley Fritschle and Paul Bays, placed 1st and earned the \$75 prize, and moved onto the State Competition which takes place in July. Levi Sutton, son of Jason Sutton and Brenda Higginbotham, placed 2nd and earned the \$50 prize.

ADDENDUM

In July of 2025, Mallory Rottler, the daughter of Wade and Maria Rottler, earned \$7,500 and 2nd place in the nation. Point of interest, the VFW has chosen to make a granite memorial of Caroline's drawing.

MSU

This was the 6th year (2025-2026) MSU had a Juried Art Exhibition. It opens June 1st. There are only 3 monetary prizes, the rest are chosen as Honorable Mention (4th place), Merit Awards or exhibitors. However it is a privilege to have work exhibited, because only 50 are chosen from about 500 entries from throughout the state of Missouri. Last year we did well, and had 7 pieces exhibited. This year we have 3 pieces exhibited; 1 by Anna Fischer and 1 by Camille Melahn which both earned the Merit Awards, Caroline Roth will be exhibiting 1 piece.

SEMO

This is a regional competition where about 100 pieces are chosen to be exhibited from about 350 entries. Only 15 pieces may be entered from each teacher, we had 11 pieces make it this year. Trinity Monroe (1 piece), Elcie Schweigert (1 piece), Camille Melahn (1 piece), Caroline Roth (1 piece), Kaitlyn Jarvis (1 piece), Linley Wehner (1 piece), Josef Rottler (1 piece), Alivia Bays (2 pieces), and Anna Fischer (2 pieces), were chosen to have their artwork exhibited for an entire month in the Crisp Gallery on the SEMO River Campus. Camille Melahn earned third in Color Drawing. Kaitlyn Jarvis earned 2nd and Anna Fischer earned 3rd respectively in Black and White Drawing. Trinity Monroe was named Honorable Mention in the category Ceramics, while Elcie Schweigert was Best in the category of Ceramics. Elcie earned a monetary prize of \$50.

In the category of Beginning Color is where we lost out, but we took 3 places. Second place, Anna Fischer. Third, Camille Melahn. and Honorable Mention, Jada Morrow. In the Beginning Drawing category we placed 3. Noah Kertz, 1st and \$25. And 2 Honorable Mentions; Cierra Voelker and Gabi Watts. Beginning 3D, first place, Josef Rottler, \$25. 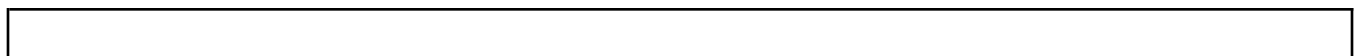

Goal 1: ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Description: Empower all members of our Dragon Family to continuously progress toward tailored learning goals.

1. Objective: Data Collection and Analysis

- a. Strategy – Use of Data:** All K-12 faculty will use data to guide instruction, learning, and assessment.
 - 1. Action Step:** Use development training, resources, NWEA/GLA/EOC released items, and interim assessments to create NWEA/GLA/EOC-like common formative assessments to better prepare students for state assessments.
 - 2. Action Step:** Use Student Learning Objectives (SLO) to create SMART goals that focus on student growth.
 - 3. Action Step:** Use data from NWEA and other local assessments to help guide instruction, student learning, and assessment.
 - 4. Action Step:** Use academic and attendance data to identify at-risk students entering SGHS as ninth grade students or those transferring into the district after completing ninth grade.
- b. Strategy – Data Collection/Analysis:** The district will utilize assessment software and technology tools for data collection and analysis to assist with student performance monitoring and district needs (NWEA).
 - 1. Action Step:** Select and implement assessment tools capable of test generation and progress monitoring.

c. **Strategy – 2020 Attendance Target:** The district will use a variety of methods to keep parents and students informed of attendance status. The district will work to ensure that student attendance rates meet or exceed the state standard. The attendance targets for the state use individual student’s attendance rates and set the expectation that 90% of the students are in attendance 90% of the time.

1. **Action Step:** Continue to review and revise the district’s attendance policy as needed to ensure compliance with the Annual Performance Report at the 2020 target level.

2. **Action Step:** Advise students and parents of district attendance policies upon enrollment.

3. **Action Step:** Provide parents access to a student information system, when appropriate, in order to allow parents to view student attendance.

4. **Action Step:** Monitor attendance on a daily basis and attempt to contact parents of absent students.

5. **Action Step:** Conduct attendance conferences with students and parents.

6. **Action Step:** Notify parents in writing when students are in danger of violating attendance policy.

7. **Action Step:** Contact the Missouri Department of Social Services (Children’s Services and/or Juvenile Officer) and local law enforcement in cases where lack of attendance may result in educational neglect.

8. **Action Step:** Maintain alternative programs for students in grades 9-12 unable to attend or function in a regular school setting.

9. **Action Step:** Facilitate home visits for cases involving lack of attendance.

2. Objective: Curriculum Resources and Alignment

a. **Strategy - High Expectations:** High expectations for teaching, learning of basic skills (especially in mathematics and reading), and the issuance of grades on a regular basis are conveyed to faculty, staff, and students.

1. **Action Step:** Principals – Use weekly bulletins and/or monthly faculty meetings to clearly communicate high performance expectations.

b. **Strategy – Collaborative Lessons:** Provide collaborative lessons that teach students to use critical thinking skills and ethical research methods.

1. **Action Step:** Continue to support and encourage cultural education and exposure through a variety of collaboration efforts including global collaborations, virtual experiences, etc.

2. **Action Step:** Library Media Specialists, Counselors, School Resource Officer, and School Social Worker – Conduct library orientation and lessons covering internet, app, and social media safety, and digital citizenship etiquette.

c. **Strategy – Lesson Plans:** All faculty will complete lesson plans that are cross-referenced to local curriculum maps and the Missouri Learning Standards to implement the written, board approved curriculum.

1. **Action Step:** SGHS Faculty – Complete/maintain online resources/plans that are cross-referenced to local curriculum maps and the Missouri Learning Standards.

2. **Action Step:** Principals – Review lesson plans when appropriate and work with faculty who show poor planning.

d. **3. Strategy – Professional Development/Life-Long Learning:** The district recognizes the relationship between professional growth and student achievement. The district, therefore, commits to encourage and assist the faculty in their pursuit of life-long learning, advanced degrees/certifications, and professional development opportunities that address differentiated

instruction, instructional strategies, at-risk student needs, and improved reading and writing skills to bring about improved assessment results.

1. Action Step: Continue to explore and support partnership opportunities with universities to allow courses to be taken on the Ste. Genevieve R-II campus to assist building/classroom leaders in the pursuit of advanced degrees and pedagogy enhancement.

2. Action Step: Continue to support and encourage faculty to identify and attend educational related professional development opportunities.

e. Strategy – At-Risk Students: Evaluate at-risk programs and report to the school board annually. Review, revise and expand, as needed, all at-risk programs currently in place.

1. Action Step: Obtain input from faculty and staff through grade-level teams regarding identification and placement of at-risk students.

2. Action Step: Continue to utilize and expand computer programs for all at-risk programs.

3. Action Step: SGHS – Continue to implement and evaluate the effectiveness of the Dragon FIRE program that provides two weekly 35-minute periods of tutoring and mentoring for students. Grade-Level Teams utilize progress report failure lists to guide student interventions.

4. Action Step: SGHS- Continue to implement and evaluate the effectiveness of the Advisory Intervention program that provides three weekly 20-minutes periods of tutoring for students.

5. Action Step: School Social Worker – Work with parents, SG R-II SRO, staff and community resources to build connections and help students solve and cope with problems in their lives.

6. Action Step: School Social Worker – Work with parents, teachers, SRO, and school administrators to develop plans and strategies to improve students' academic performance, attendance, and social development.

7. Action Step: Continue to partner with Community Counseling to provide on site School Based Counseling for identified students.

3. Objective: Technology Integration

a. Strategy – Use of Technology: Faculty and administration will use up-to-date technology tools and resources to develop inquiry-based curricula and instruction to support curriculum objectives. Tools and resources are readily available for faculty and student use. Training in the use of the tools and resources is provided and continually supported.

1. Action Step: Continue to provide building principals with professional development opportunities on technology tools, teacher evaluation tools, and/or book studies on leadership, best instructional practices, and data collection.

2. Action Step: Principals – Model effective use of technology by integrating technology into meetings and presentations (as appropriate) and by creating/maintaining online resources to disseminate information.

3. Action Step: New Faculty – Attend adequate technology training prior to the start of the school year and throughout the school year.

4. Action Step: Provide grade level and content area specific training on technology integration after school, during scheduled professional development days, summer and other available times.

5. Action Step: Faculty – Maintain teacher online presence through relevant media or platforms.

6. Action Step: Principals/Library Coordinator/Librarians – Ensure online resources are available to students and parents and that information is current and up-to-date.

7. Action Step: District Office Administration/Principals - Support opportunities for faculty to continue education related to technological tools and programs.

8. Action Step: Director of Communications/Principals/Athletic Director/Teachers – Continually update and post athletic, academic, special events, and reminders as needed through social media and district outlets.

9. Action Step: Director of Communications/Principals/Faculty – Share daily happenings, accomplishments, and celebrations using appropriate technological tools and media (webpage, social media, etc.).

- b. Strategy – Curriculum Integration:** Technology will be fully integrated into the curriculum and instruction for all students as measured through the evaluation process. The district will utilize the curriculum revision process to ensure technology skills are integrated into all areas of curriculum to enhance learning by providing increased opportunities for research, problem-solving, exploration and communication.
- 1. Action Step:** Instruction on ethical behaviors and critical analysis of information obtained from technology.
- 2. Action Step:** Design instruction to teach students how to ask the creative, innovative, and even impossible questions using primary source materials.
- c. Strategy – ISTE for Students:** The district curriculum will utilize technology in developing students' 21st century skills (information, communication technology, and media literacy) by referencing the International Society for Technology in Education (ISTE) for students.
- 1. Action Step:** Integrate portfolio development in the high school to showcase student work and to provide evidence of their knowledge of 21st century skills.
- d. Strategy – Technology to Facilitate Learning:** The district will use technology tools and resources to facilitate learning for all students.
- 1. Action Step:** Maintain a student/parent portal for access to current grades and attendance.
- 2. Action Step:** Provide and maintain an internet accessible device for every student in grades K-12.
- 3. Action Step:** Create or integrate coding, robotics, drone, and Esport curriculum, and emerging technologies to promote student innovation and creativity.
- e. Strategy – Library Media Center Technology:** The district will use up-to-date, appropriate technology tools and resources in all building Library Media Centers.
- 1. Action Step:** Maintain Library Media Center web presence that are current and provide links to credible information.
- 2. Action Step:** Maintain reputable, cost-efficient print materials which have been purchased to support and enhance the curricula.
- 3. Action Step:** Maintain authoritative, credible on-line databases to support curricular needs.
- 4. Action Step:** Maintain access to eBooks to improve learning.
- 5. Action Step:** R. W. Thomas Library – Continue to support the downstairs section of the library as a media center with 3D and interactive technology, robotics, multimedia room, video creation and edition opportunities, and other strategies that promote student innovation and creativity.
- f. Strategy – Safe Tools/Resources:** The district will maintain appropriate and safe technology tools and resources that promote personal, academic, and career needs.
- 1. Action Step:** Provide students and faculty with information for internet safety through a variety of means.
- 2. Action Step:** Provide resources for parents related to internet and social media safety using a variety of methods.

Goal 2: COLLABORATIVE CLIMATE AND CULTURE

Description: Empower all members of our Dragon Family to continuously progress toward tailored learning goals.

1. Objective: Student Voice and Choice

a. **Strategy** - The district will provide a variety of opportunities to garnish student voice and choice within each of the buildings.

1. **Action Step:** Student leaders will be provided an opportunity to serve on the Principal's Advisory Council as a means to bridge the gap between administration and students.

2. **Action Step:** Students will have input in the creation of their schedule through Google Forms and this input will help counselors and administration build schedules (may be influenced by graduation progress and course capacity).

3. **Action Step:** Students have access to the counseling offices and the space has been transformed into an inviting space for students to spend time.

4. **Action Step:** Teachers will be pushing into advisory classes to provide lessons and skills to address deficiencies in social and emotional areas.

5. Objective: Mental Health Resources and Supports

a. **Strategy** – The district will strengthen mental health resources and supports by implementing proactive interventions and assessments, leveraging data to address student needs, and integrating specialists into classrooms to foster emotional well-being and resilience.

1. **Action Step:** Advisory specialist teachers will continue to push into classrooms to deliver mini-lessons focused on mental health, coping strategies, and emotional regulation throughout the school year. These lessons will be aligned with developmental needs and school-wide mental health initiatives, creating an environment where students can discuss mental health openly.

2. **Action Step:** Students will complete the SAEBRS student self-assessment quarterly. This social-emotional behavior assessment will provide insight into their well-being. The data collected will be shared with grade-level teams through visual dashboards to facilitate targeted support discussions during student meetings, ensuring that interventions are timely and based on real-time data.

3. **Action Step:** Grade-level teams will meet regularly to review SAEBRS data, identify trends, and plan interventions for students needing additional mental health support. Teams will also develop individualized action plans for students at risk, ensuring continuous support and follow-up.

4. **Action Step:** The district will provide ongoing professional development for both advisory specialists and classroom teachers to ensure they are equipped with the skills and knowledge to address mental health concerns, recognize signs of distress, and provide immediate support within the classroom setting.

6. Objective: Family Involvement

a. **Strategy – Parent/Family Involvement:** Policy IGBC – Parent/Family Involvement in Instructional and Other Programs. The Board of Education recognizes the importance of eliminating barriers that impede parent/family involvement, thereby facilitating an environment that encourages collaboration with parents, families and other members of the community.

Therefore, the district will develop and implement a plan to facilitate parent/family involvement that shall include the following six goals: (1) promote regular, two-way, meaningful communication between home and school; (2) Promote and support responsible parenting; (3) recognize the fact that parents/families play an integral role in assisting their children to learn; (4) promote a safe and open atmosphere for parents/families to visit the schools their children attend, and actively solicit parent/family support and assistance for school programs; (5) include parents as full partners in decisions affecting their children and families; and (6) use available community resources to strengthen and promote school programs, family practices and the achievement of students.

1. Action Step: SGHS – Review and implement strategies for Parent/Family Involvement Plans.

b. Strategy – Open House: Annual open house and informational meetings will be held to inform and educate parents about curriculum and available services.

1. Action Step: Conduct an open house at each building during the month of August.

2. Action Step: Faculty – Give parents opportunities to view technology tools used within the classroom.

c. Strategy – Parent-Teacher Conferences: Annual parent-teacher conferences will be offered to provide opportunities for personal communication between parents, faculty and students.

1. Action Step: Communicate information regarding parent-teacher conferences with parents through (but not be limited to) district calendar, district website, letters, school wide calls, text messages, apps, and other forms of social media.

2. Action Step: Communicate parent-teacher conference expectations with faculty and develop student led conferences for upper elementary classes.

3. Action Step: Communication information in regards to community collaborations on drug prevention & resources provided by the community to parents.

d. Strategy – Communication: The district will continue to support the use of technology tools and resources to improve communication and provide opportunities for input/feedback from the community.

1. Action Step: Inform parents at meetings and by newsletter, e-mail, and/or handbook of the resources available on the district web page.

2. Action Step: Promote the use of email, parent notification systems, parent access to the student information system, social media, and district's website to communicate school information to parents and community.

3. Action Step: Develop and update teacher websites/online classroom services, or other technology tools, to enhance teacher/parent and teacher/student contact.

e. Strategy - Community Connections: The district will continue to make connections with parents and the community as it strives to build positive relationships and engage all stakeholders.

1. Action Step: The district will publish and promote its various activities through newsletters and other online resources.

2. Action Step: SGHS will continue to build connections between student & community organizations.

Goal 3: LEADERSHIP AND DEVELOPMENT

Description: Equip all members of our Dragon Family with resources to develop and sustain meaningful life skills.

1. Objective: Varied Pathways for Post-Graduation Opportunities

- a. **Strategy – College and Career Readiness:** Ste. Genevieve High School will provide adequate post-secondary preparation for all students.
 - 1. **Action Step: ACT:** Maintain the availability of ACT testing to students in grades 11 and 12.
 - 2. **Action Step: ACT WorkKeys National Career Readiness Certificate (ACT WorkKeys NCRC):** Maintain the availability of ACT WorkKeys NCRC to students in grades 11 and 12.
 - 3. **Action Step: ASVAB:** Continue to administer the ASVAB to students in grade 11.
 - 4. **Action Step: ACCUPLACER:** Provide opportunities for students in grades 11 and 12 to participate in ACCUPLACER testing.
 - 5. **Action Step: TSA:** Investigate/administer TSA tests that correlate to an Industry Recognized Credential (IRC).
 - 6. **Action Step: College Credit:** Continue to support and investigate new opportunities for college/dual credit offerings within the school day.
- b. **Strategy – School to Work:** The district will provide additional school-to-work and vocational opportunities for students not planning to attend post-secondary institutions.
 - 1. **Action Step:** Continue to seek and support transitional programs for students at the high level.
 - 2. **Action Step:** Continue to seek and support career exploration programs for students who participate in vocational training programs on the Ste. Genevieve R-II campus.
 - 3. **Action Step:** Continue to seek and support career exploration programs for students who are attending the Perryville Area Career and Technology Center.

2. Objective: Professional Development

- a. **Strategy – Content Specific Professional Development:** Faculty will participate in professional development targeting improved skills and differentiated instruction.
 - 1. **Action Step:** Faculty – Attend and collaborate on the development of content specific training.
 - 2. **Action Step:** Faculty – Analyze NWEA data and use this information to seek professional development opportunities that will enhance instruction in the areas of English Language Arts, Mathematics, and Science.
 - 3. **Action Step:** Faculty – Analyze state and common assessment data and use this information to seek professional development opportunities that will enhance instruction.
- b. **Strategy – School Reform Initiatives:** Grades 9-12 will continue to implement school reform processes to continue improvement in annual performance.
 - 1. **Action Step:** Team Leaders – Continue to receive on-going training and serve on leadership committees.
 - 2. **Action Step:** Continue to support grade level team collaboration, and core and non-core collaboration.
- c. **Strategy – Collaboration Opportunities:** Faculty will use planned collaboration opportunities for development; focusing on sharing information from conferences, instructional strategies, best practices, action research, and book studies; analyzing MAP GLA/EOC data; developing/analyzing Student Learning Objectives, and common assessments; discussions regarding individual student learning; and to analyze/develop curriculum and curriculum mapping.
 - 1. **Action Step:** Engage in professional development related to research based instructional strategies.

2. Action Step: Engage in the analysis EOC Data, Student Learning Objectives, and common assessment data and use this information to help guide instruction.

3. Action Step: Administer a common assessment, Student Learning Objectives, and participate in the data analysis of the results to help guide instruction.

3. Objective: Character & Behavior

a. Strategy – Student Transition: The high school counseling department will create a transition plan for middle school to high school students.

1. Action Step: Continue to discuss transition issues and develop potential action plans to address those issues.

2. Action Step: Set up student shadow experiences for students interested in attending the Ste. Genevieve R-II School District. Shadow experiences will be facilitated by counselor contact or requests from parents/guardians during time frames that building leaders (principals, counselors, and teachers) deem appropriate.

3. Action Step: New student to SGHS – Provide technology training for new students who are transitioning to SGHS through peer mentoring through our School Development Seminar.

4. Action Step: SGHS Counselor and Principals – In the fall, hold an evening parent orientation meeting for all 9th grade students and their parents to get to know SGHS.

5. Action Step: SGHS Mentor Students and 9th Grade Counselor – Continually train mentor students. Mentor students are 12th grade students who will meet with and mentor weekly 9th grade students during advisory throughout the school year. They will also lead their advisory during Mentor Games throughout the second semester. Mentor students assist the counselors with new student mixers and transitioning new students.

6. Action Step: 9th Grade Counselor – Hold an orientation program before school begins to help new 9th grade students acquaint themselves with the building, expectations, and procedures at SGHS.

7. Action Step: SGHS Mentor Students – Hold a New Student Mixer activity at the beginning of each school year.

4. Objective: Career Exploration and Preparation

a. Strategy – Career Awareness: The district will organize activities and events at all buildings to promote career awareness and planning with students and parents.

1. Action Step: SGHS Counselors – Conduct a college and career planning night for parents and students at the high school.

2. Action Step: SGHS Counselors – Provide ongoing information to parents to plan funding mechanisms for post-secondary education.

3. Action Step: SGHS Counselors – Conduct a financial aid presentation for parents and students at high school.

4. Action Step: SGHS Counselors and Faculty – Offer an ACT prep class at the high school and ACT review sessions during DragonFIRE for all students in grade 11.

b. Strategy – Missouri Connections & ICAP (Individual Career and Academic Plan): Implement Missouri Connections and ICAP with students to help them determine occupational interest and aptitudes.

1. Action Step: SGHS Counselors – Assist students in the development of personal plans of study in 8th grade and provide opportunities to update annually.

2. Action Step: SGHS Counselors – Provide parents access to and support using the Missouri Connections and ICAP information for their child.

- c. **Strategy – Job Shadowing/Apprenticeships:** Maintain a database that will serve as a clearinghouse for potential job shadowing sites, mentors, and apprenticeships.
1. **Action Step:** SGHS Principals – Annually meet with Ste. Genevieve Area Chamber of Commerce and Perryville Area Career and Technology Center to promote and update potential job shadowing/apprenticeship programs.
 2. **Action Step:** SGHS Counselors and A+ Coordinator – Facilitate job shadowing/apprenticeship opportunities to all grade level appropriate students each spring.
 3. **Action Step:** SGHS Administration and Counselors: Utilize DragonFLEX to partner with local industries in order to provide opportunities for students in 11th and 12th grade.
 4. **Action Step:** SGHS will continue to promote students participating in AG SAE, CDA, and SBE programs to provide internship opportunities during the school day.
