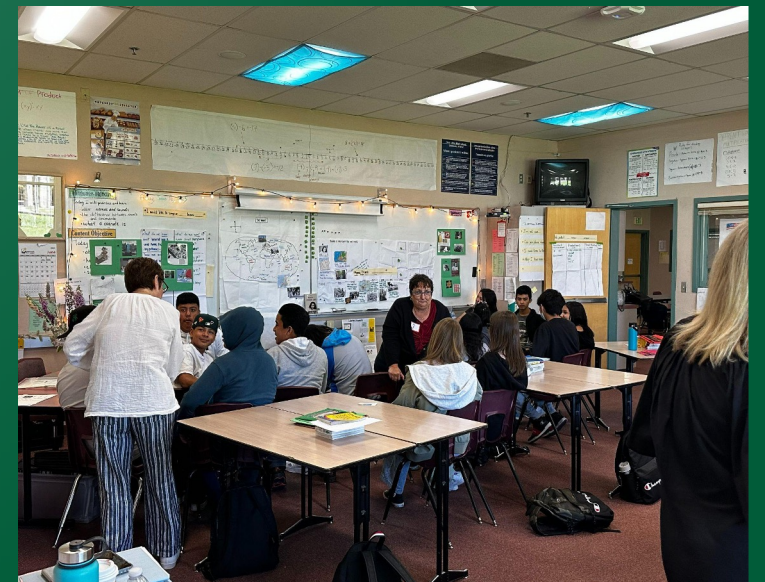


Newcomer English Program

Location: Elsie Allen High School

Dates: June 13 - June 30

- Offered to rising 9th-12th graders (Non- Migrant Education).
- Focus on strengthening phonemic awareness and basic grammar skills.
- Class hosted the Guided Language Acquisition Design (GLAD) training for secondary teachers through Social Studies unit.
- Number of SRCS students served & received five English credits: 19
- Number of SRCS teachers who attended the GLAD Secondary training: 15





High School Credit Recovery

Location: Elsie Allen High School
Session #1 Dates: June 13 - June 30
Session #2 Dates: July 11- July 28

→ Open to 9th - 11th graders and non-graduating Seniors who have failed high school courses required for graduation.

- ◆ Focus on courses students have already taken, and failed.
- ◆ Courses were completed in person, with the support of a teacher.
- ◆ Both Cyber High Classes and Teacher led classes were offered.

→ Program Data:

- ◆ First Session
 - 339 Completers earned 1687 Credits
- ◆ Second Session
 - 208 Completers earned 1035 Credits
- ◆ 72 Senior non Grads from all 6 high schools returned to Summer School to complete Grad requirements
 - 33 Seniors met graduation requirements
- ◆ 207 Cyber High Courses were completed earning 1014 credits

Migrant Education Secondary

- Federally funded summer program that serves migrant students in grades from 6th through 12th grades.
- Hosted by Migrant Ed at Santa Rosa Junior College.
- Central components include development of cultural awareness and pride, as well as providing opportunities for credit recovery.
- Full day program ran for six weeks, and offered classes in mathematics, English, science, college readiness, history and Ballet Folklorico.
- Serving students from across the county, the program served 109 SRCS students this summer.

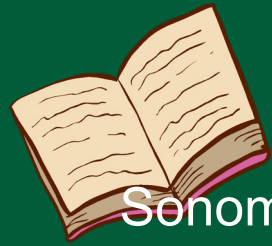

- Parents/Guardians were invited on the last day of each session for an open house!

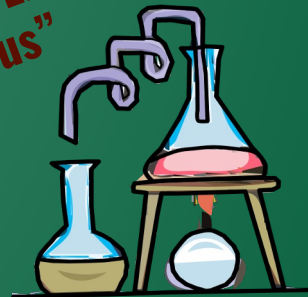

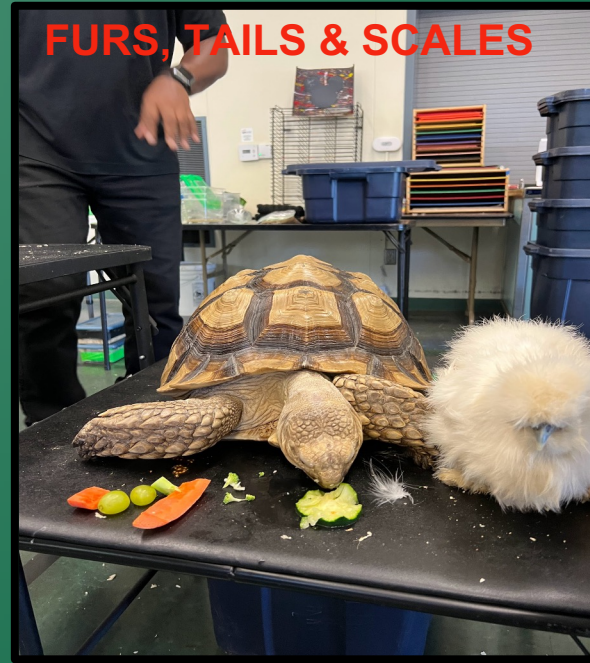

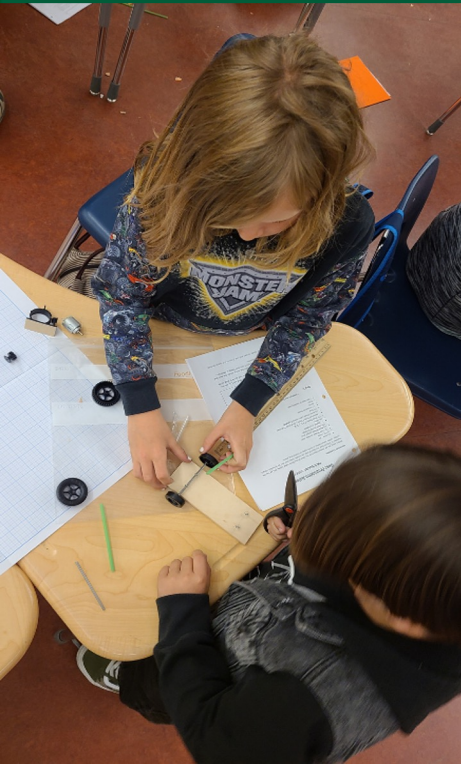

Charter Programs

Cesar Chavez Language Academy

- Served 85 students in K-5th grade for 3 weeks in June.
- Reading Focus
 - Novel studies in 4th-6th
 - 3 Instructional Assistants pushed in to Kinder - 3rd grade classes to provide targeted small group literacy instruction for each child each day.
- Math Focus
 - Games, manipulative, learning stations
- GLAD units not covered during the school year.





MathLab

- Served 40+ incoming 4th-6th grade students from 10 SRCS Elementary and Charter Schools for 8 days in June 2023.
- Expanded on previous professional learning at SRCS in partnership with SCOE incorporating research-based strategies from Dr. Boaler in support of the development of a positive identity and growth mindset in students.
- Students were given low-floor, high-ceiling tasks, showing them that everyone can engage and succeed in high-level mathematics.
- Teachers were able to learn from other teachers as they implemented research-based strategies in a learning lab context, which included collaboration, lesson observation, reflection on practices, and opportunities for feedback.
- An SRCS Observing Teacher said to a visiting SRCS Director: “Thank you for providing this amazing opportunity. This is exactly the kind of PD I have been looking for.”



Boys & Girls Club Program

- Integrated with Elementary Academy and Migrant Programs to offer full 9-hour day for students and families. (ELOP funding)
- Supported students in variety of enrichment activities in afternoon programming.
- Coordinated and led by Katie Elze and staffed with existing Boys & Girls Club team members from across the district.
- Incorporated several special themed events and contests, including:
 - Boys & Girls Club Olympics
 - Coachella for Kids
 - Pie Throwing Contests
