The State Board of Education authorized the State School Superintendent to renew a contract with the National Center for the Improvement of Educational Assessment, Inc. at a cost not to exceed $\$ 170,000$ in State Funds for on-going technical assistance in support of the technical quality of the state's assessment and accountability systems.

The State Board of Education authorized the State School Superintendent to amend the grant for local educational agencies (LEAs) with schools identified as Targeted Support and Improvement and Comprehensive Support and Improvement schools by the amount of $\$ 75,000$ for a cost not to exceed $\$ 16,345,000$ in Federal Funds for the purpose of additional school improvement services. The State Board of Education authorized the State School Superintendent to renew a contract with Dell, Inc. at a cost not to exceed \$906,378.24 in State Funds for certification exams for testing Microsoft Office Specialist (MOS) and Microsoft Technology Associate (MTA) in Georgia public high schools.
7. TL-Contract Renewal - Microsoft Imagine Academy. The State Board of Education authorized the State School Superintendent to renew a contract with Dell, Inc. at a cost not to exceed $\$ 511,994.88$ in State Funds for full access to Microsoft Imagine Academy for Georgia high schools.
8. TL - Contract - Contract with the College Board to provide PSAT/NMSOT Exams. The State Board of Education authorized the State School Superintendent to enter into a contract with The College Board in State Funds at a cost not to exceed $\$ 1,382,195$ for the October 2019 PSAT/NMSQT exam.
9. TL - Contract Renewal - FY20 Georgia Virtual School/School Nutrition Desire2Learn. The State Board of Education authorized the State School Superintendent to renew a contract with Desire2Learn at a cost not to exceed $\$ 499,608.55$ in State/Federal Funds for Georgia Virtual School students, Georgia Credit Recovery students, blended learning, teacher professional development for a learning management system, and GaDOE School Nutrition.
10. TL - Contract Amendment - Joye Darwin d/b/a Leisure Time Activities. The State Board of Education authorized the State School Superintendent to amend the contract with Joye Darwin d/b/a Leisure Time Activities to increase the contract amount from to exceed $\$ 162,677$ in State/Federal funds not to exceed $\$ 249,999$ to continue services for students and allow staff to ride the charter bus for school related events and GSD home going trips.

Upon motion from Mr. Mike Long and a second from Mr. Larry Winter, the State Board of Education unanimously approved the recommendation as presented. (Appendix 16)

## I. Action Items

## 1. (Initiate) Dual Enrollment - Move On When Ready Rule (160-4-2-.34)

a. This rule is being amended to create two sections within the Rule to clarify the differences between Dual Enrollment pursuant to O.C.G.A. § 20-2-161.3 (Move on When Ready) and Dual Enrollment pursuant to O.C.G.A. § 20-2-149.2 (Senate Bill 2 from the 2015 General Assembly).
b. Dual Enrollment Move on When Ready, which will now be referred to as Option A, requires the completion of high school courses that culminate in stateadministered and state-required end-of-course assessments, while Dual Enrollment Senate Bill 2, which will now be referred to as Option B, requires the completion of high school courses that culminate in state-administered and state-required end-of-course assessments for such courses in the ninth and tenth grades (At a minimum students must complete and pass the following courses: Algebra I or Coordinate Algebra, Geometry or Analytic Geometry, Biology, and Ninth Grade Literature).
c. Dual Enrollment Option A requires 23 units of credit and completion of approved postsecondary courses that satisfy high school graduation requirements, while Dual Enrollment Option B does not require 23 units of credit but does require a TCSG associate degree or a TCSG technical college diploma or at least two TCSG college certificates.
d. Dr. Garry McGiboney presented the item.
e. This item is to be placed on the consent agenda.
2. (Approve) Special Needs Scholarship Program- 2019-2020 Private School List
a. O.C.G.A. § 20-2-2115 requires the State Board of Education to authorize private schools that will be eligible to participate in the Georgia Special Needs Scholarship (GSNS) Program.
a. The GSNS Program enrollment history:

1. $2016-2017=4,477$ SNS students
2. $2017-2018=4,664$ SNS students
3. $2018-2019=4,769$ (year to date)
b. Private schools that are interested in participating in the GSNS program have until June 30, 2019, to apply for the 2019-2020 school year.
c. Having met the GaDOE's eligibility requirements, the following private schools are seeking approval to participate in the GSNS program: Benjamin Academy; Faith Lutheran School; The Forest School; Landmark Christian School; Pinecrest Academy INC; and Social Circle Christian.
d. Dr. Garry McGiboney presented the item.
e. This item is to be placed on the consent agenda.

## 3. (Approve) Local Board Governance Training Providers FY20

a. The State Board of Education adopted training requirements for local school boards of education as required by O.C.G.A. § 20-2-230 (b).
b. The providers were solicited by posting a Request for Proposal (RFP) on the Georgia Department of Education website. The previous providers were sent an RFP by email.
c. 23 potential providers submitted applications.
d. Providers must give the Department details of their training program, qualifications and experience of their instructors, names of the courses they propose to deliver, and they must include a nepotism agreement for each instructor.
e. All new board members must receive 15 hours of training by approved providers and all veteran board members must receive 9 hours annually of training by approved providers.
f. Financial training is required but can only be delivered by the Georgia Department of Education Finance and Budget Office for new board members.
g. Dr. Garry McGiboney presented the item.
h. This item is to be placed on the consent agenda.

## 4. (Approval to Post) Elementary School Agriculture Courses

a. Senate Bill 330 allows for pilot elementary agricultural education program in Georgia.
b. Georgia Agricultural Education Elementary Standards of Excellence are designed to allow elementary students to explore Agriculture, Food \& Natural Resources.
c. These elementary agricultural standards are organized under four domains: Agricultural Systems, Foundations of Agriculture, Leadership/Career Readiness and Natural Resource Systems. Each grade level will learn key agricultural topics in these four domains.
d. Classroom and laboratory activities should include instruction in an organized classroom; collaborative agricultural learning experiences through investigation and inquiry, including laboratory and site-based learning activities; and personal and leadership development opportunities.
e. Kindergarten-Exploring Agricultural Education, First -Exploring Agricultural Education, Second-Exploring Agricultural Education, Third-Exploring Agricultural Education, Fourth-Exploring Agricultural Education, and FifthExploring Agricultural Education will be added to the State-Funded List of K-8 Subjects.
f. The projected date for implementation is school year 2019-2020.
g. This item was presented by Christa Steinkamp.
h. This item is to be placed on the consent agenda.

## 5. (Approval to Post) Middle School Agriculture Courses

a. The current middle school courses were last revised in February 2008.
b. Since that time the Georgia Department of Education has gone to the 3-course pathway model in 34 career clusters in our high schools.
c. Agricultural Education is an applied science that provides hands on learning opportunities for Ag Ed students, while exploring career \& leadership opportunities. Middle School Agricultural Education Courses are designed as exploratory courses to allow students to explore opportunities in Agriculture while applying hands on science and other academic principles within agricultural science.
d. The current middle school courses need to be to updated to reflect the changes in middle school academic standards of excellence, while preparing Middle School Ag Ed students for high school Ag Ed pathways and introducing opportunities in agriculture business and industry.
e. Exploring Agriculture Education (Sixth Grade), Exploring Agriculture Education (Seventh Grade), and Exploring Agriculture Education (Eighth Grade) will be added to the State-Funded List of K-8 Subjects.
f. The projected date for implementation is school year 2019-2020.
g. This item was presented by Christa Steinkamp.
$h$. This item is to be placed on the consent agenda.
6. (Approval to Post) Middle School Engineering and Technology Education Courses
a. The current middle school courses were last revised in February 2008.
b. Since that time the Georgia Department of Education has gone to the 3-course pathway model in 17 career clusters in our high schools.
c. Technology and the work environment are considerably different now than they were 10 years ago.
d. The updated and revised courses Exploring Engineering and Technology, Invention and Innovation, and Technological Systems will be added to the StateFunded List of K-8 Subjects.
e. The projected date for implementation is school year 2019-2020.
f. This item was presented by Roger Ivey.
g. This item is to be placed on the consent agenda.

## 7. (Approval to Post) Middle School Law and Public Safety Courses

a. The current middle school courses were last revised in Spring 2010 for implementation in Fall 2010.
b. Since that time the Georgia Department of Education has gone to the 3-course pathway model in 17 career clusters in our high schools.
c. Technology and the work environment are considerably different now than they were 10 years ago.
d. The current middle school courses need to be aligned to the pathway offerings in high school and need to reflect the changes law and public safety policies, procedures, and protocols.
e. Fire and Emergency Management Services- CERT \& Homeland Security, Exploring Law and Criminal Proceedings, and Exploring Law Enforcement and be added to the State-Funded List of K-8 Subjects.
f. The projected date for implementation is school year 2019-2020.
g. This item was presented by Tiffany Barney.
h. This item is to be placed on the consent agenda.

## 8. (Approval to Post) High School Science Courses - Georgia Standards of Excellence

## MINUTES

1. The meeting was called to order by State Board of Education (SBOE) District Flexibility and Charter Schools Committee Chair Kevin Boyd at 9:00 A.M.

- In addition to Mr. Boyd, Committee members Lisa Kinnemore and Trey Allen were present, and Committee member and SBOE Chair Scott Johnson joined the meeting in progress at 9:18 A.M.
- Newly appointed SBOE members Dr. David "Butch" Mosely, Scott Sweeney, and Mr. Jason Downey were also present and SBOE members Helen Rice and Lee Anne Cowart joined the meeting in progress; all five left the meeting at 9:45 A.M. for the Rules Committee meeting. Mr. Johnson left the meeting at 9:55 A.M.
- Georgia Department of Education Deputy Superintendent of Policy and External Affairs Dr. Garry McGiboney; Director of Communications Meghan Frick; Associate State Superintendent for District Flexibility, Charter Schools, Policy, and Governmental Affairs Louis J. Erste; District Flexibility and Charter Schools (DF\&CS) Director Allen Mueller; and DF\&CS Division Attorney Francesca Black were also present. Dr. McGiboney and Ms. Frick also left the meeting at 9:45 A.M. for the Rules Committee meeting.
- Also present at the table were Charter Advisory Committee (CAC) Chair Mark Whitlock; Governor's Office of Student Achievement (GOSA) Policy and Research Analyst Haley Steed; State Charter Schools Commission (SCSC) Interim Executive Director and General Counsel Gregg Stevens; Georgia Charter Schools Association Executive Vice President of Policy and External Affairs Dr. Bonnie Holliday; and former Senator Dan Weber, Executive Director of the Charter System Foundation.
- Griffin-Spalding County School System Superintendent James Smith and his team were present. Superintendents of the charter systems being considered for charter contract renewal joined the meeting by conference call, including Dr. Shanna Downs of Gilmer County Schools and Mr. Garrett Wilcox of Vidalia City Schools. Charter school and public education advocates were also present.

2. Mr. Boyd welcomed the Committee and new SBOE members, staff, and others in attendance. Ms. Kinnemore read the Committee's Mission Statement.
3. At Mr. Boyd's request, Mr. Erste introduced Mr. Smith, who presented a Griffin-Spalding County School System accountability update, including information on their 2016 comprehensive curriculum audit and its 10 recommendations, all which were completed implemented or in progress. Mr. Smith described key initiatives implemented as a part of its strategic plan to improve overall student achievement and performance, including their district-wide balanced literacy plan, Zero to 5 initiative, school nursing program, and Project Aware. Follow up questions were asked by the Committee and discussion ensued.
4. Mr. Erste introduced the Action Items on the Committee's agenda.
5. At Mr. Boyd's request, Mr. Mueller presented the Department's recommendation that the State Board of Education approve a five-year charter system renewal for Gilmer County Schools. Mr. Whitlock presented the Charter Advisory Committee's unanimous recommendation that the SBOE approve the charter system renewal. Follow up questions were asked by the Committee and answered by Dr. Downs and her team, and discussion ensued. Mr. Boyd requested, and Mr. Johnson made a motion to move this Action Item to the Consent Agenda. Ms. Kinnemore seconded the motion, which was approved 4-0.
6. Mr. Mueller presented the Department's recommendation that the State Board of Education approve a five-year charter system renewal for Vidalia City Schools. Mr. Whitlock presented the Charter Advisory Committee's unanimous recommendation that the SBOE approve the charter system renewal. Follow up questions were asked by the Committee and answered by Mr. Wilcox, and discussion ensued. Mr. Boyd requested, and Mr. Allen made a motion to move this Action Item to the Consent Agenda. Ms. Kinnemore seconded the motion, which was approved 4-0.
7. At Mr. Boyd's request, Mr. Mueller presented the Department's recommendation that the State Board of Education approve amendments to the performance contracts of Calhoun City Schools (add an existing college and career academy), Jones County (add a waiver of the fair Dismissal Act), and Paulding County Schools (add a new college and career academy). Follow up questions were asked by the Committee and answered by GaDOE staff, and discussion ensued. Mr. Boyd requested, and Ms. Kinnemore made a motion to move these three Action Items to the Consent Agenda. Mr. Allen seconded the motion, which was approved unanimously 4-0.
8. At Mr. Boyd's request, Mr. Erste presented the Department's recommendation that the State Board of Education approve the 2019-20 list of Charter School Governing Board Training Providers. Follow up questions were asked by the Committee and answered by GaDOE staff, and discussion ensued. Mr. Boyd requested, and Mr. Allen made a motion to move this Action Item to the Consent Agenda. Mr. Johnson seconded the motion, which was approved unanimously 4-0.
9. At Mr. Boyd's request, the following updates were presented.

- Mr. Whitlock reported that the Charter Advisory Committee (CAC) had a regular meeting on April 12, 2019, where they received updates on the 2019 legislative session, Charter System Foundation activities, and Department consultants work with charter systems.
- Ms. Steed reported on the Governor's Office of Student Achievement's (GOSA) work on the school improvement plans of Strategic Waiver School Systems (SWSS) which had one or more schools that did not meet SWSS targets in 201617. GOSA will distribute a survey to those schools to obtain feedback on the school improvement plan process.
- Mr. Stevens reported that the deadline to submit a state charter school petition for the 2020-2021 academic year was April 12, 2019. The State Charter Schools Commission (SCSC) received 26 petitions this cycle and will interview eligible petitioners in June. SCSC expects to make recommendations for school approvals to the SCSC in July or August. In addition, five new state charter schools are opening in the fall.
- Dr. Holliday reported that the Georgia Charter Schools Association (GCSA) is working with the Department to obtain charter school comments on the department's new comprehensive performance framework that will be offered as a charter contract amendment to all charter schools. She announced that Governor Kemp will issue a proclamation in honor of National Charter Schools Week next week and invited the SBOE members to attend.

10. Mr. Mueller reviewed the 2018-2019 Petition Pipeline, and noted the following:

- Work on charter school contract renewals for Bishop Hall Charter School and William Hutchings College and Career Academy are in progress.
- The Department continues to work on the execution of the 132 SBOE-approved SWSS contract amendments related to the reset of the CCRPI baseline year to 2018.
- The Department received 22 letters of intent to apply for a charter to open new charter schools in 2019-2020.

11. Mr. Erste then announced to impending departure of Ms. Black, who will be joining the Office of the Fulton County Attorney in mid-May.
12. At Mr. Boyd's invitation, Mr. Weber provided an update on the Charter System Foundation's work with charter systems on the Department's Consolidation of Funds Initiative and on the State Innovative Assessment Pilot, including its project with Madison County Schools to develop a web portal to assist district finance directors with completing and submitting the end-of-the year financial reports required by the Consolidation of Funds Initiative. The Foundation will present information on the Innovative Assessment Pilot at the Capitol on June 18, 2019.
13. Mr. Boyd adjourned the meeting at 10:23 A.M. without objection.
