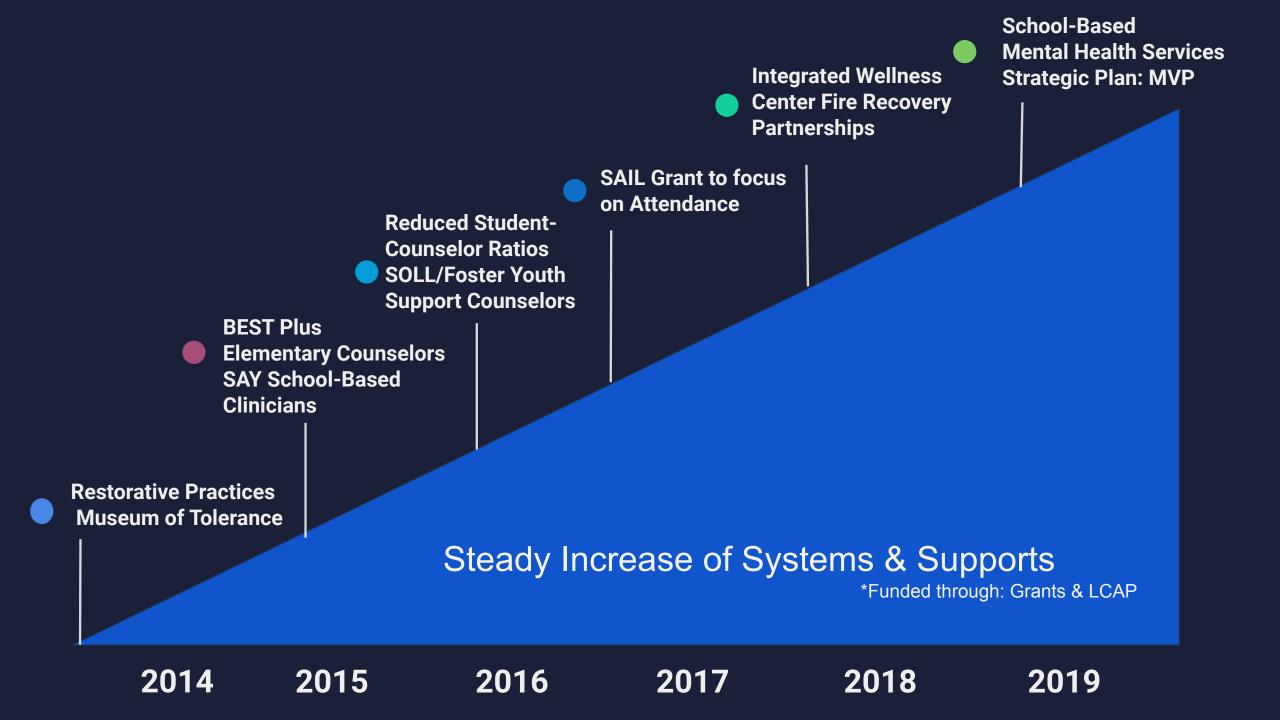

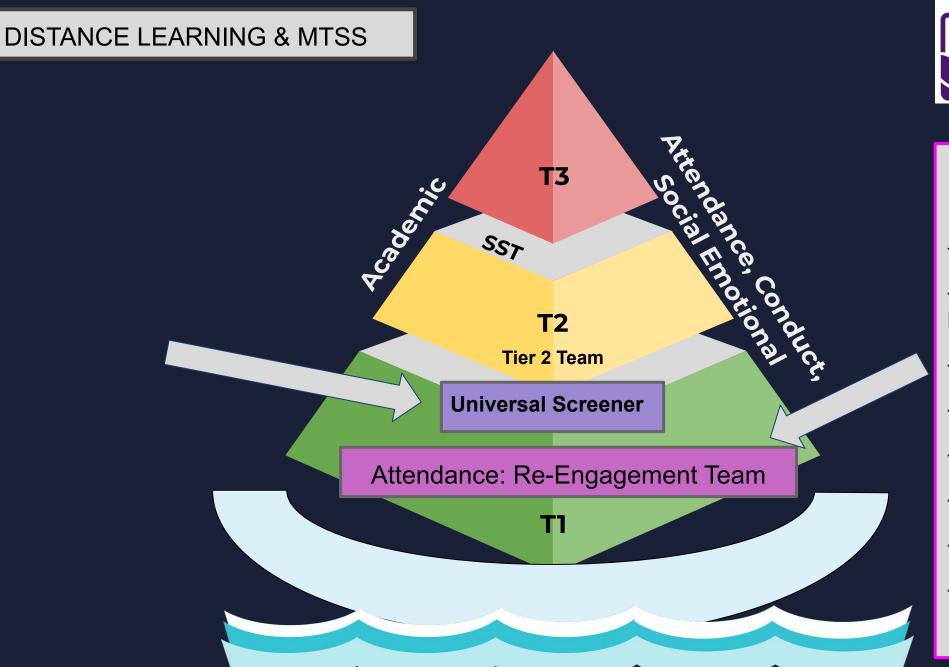
Using Multiple Data points and screener responses, teams re-engage students and respond to their needs

- Multi-Tiered Systems of Support in all schools

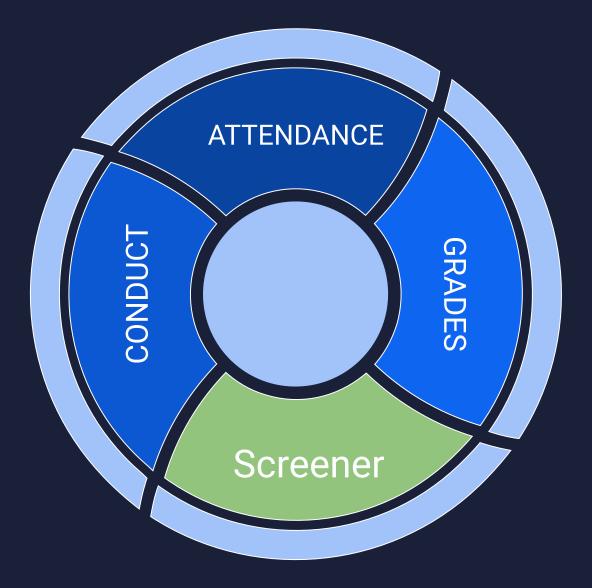

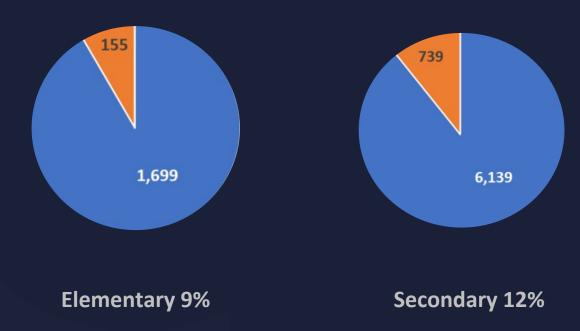
Behavior is Communication: Data Points To Clues



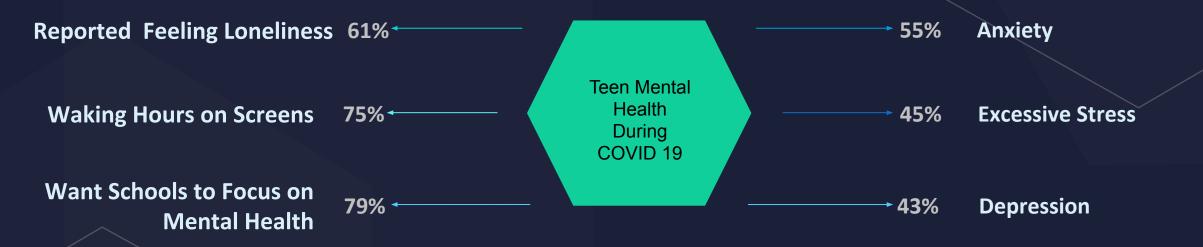
Overall Fall 2020 Screener Completion Rate

Currently in Progress:

- Continue to leverage outside funding to strengthen programming
- Create Tele-Wellness Center as resource hub and ways for students, families and staff to connect with supports
- Crisis Response Teams at each site to focus on mental health crisis management and sucide prevention, intervention and postvention
- Create Tiered Social-Emotional Wellness Program
- Update Comprehensive School Counseling Plan

- Consider Optional BP 5141.5 on Mental Health Programs
- Continue to expand district staffing to provide mental health responses and to reduce reliance on contractors
