



### Exhibit 1: Kindergarten Compared to Live Births Five Years Prior




# Exhibit 2: Live Births: Actual History and Projected Live Births




#### **Exhibit 3: WCPSS Market Share**






### **Exhibit 5: New Residential Building Permits**




# **Exhibit 6: Multi-Family vs. Single Family Building Permits**




### **Exhibit 7: Unemployment Rate**




# Exhibit 8: Student Membership Percentage Growth



#### **Comparison of Projections**



#### Reasons for changes in projections

- > Increased loss of projected membership to non-WCPSS school programs-particularly charter schools and including virtual schools
- > Wake County Resident Live Births (RLB) are projected to increase, continuing trend of recent years
- > Expected reversal of the flat Grade K trend of past years, as RLB rates continue to grow and in-migration increases
- > K is projected to start increasing unlike prior years, largely due to RLBs increasing
- > Students are returning at higher grades from non-public schools
- > An increasingly aging population

4,068 fewer students are projected by 2025 than last year's forecast; this reflects a gain of 25,781 students over the next nine years.

17,322 fewer students are projected by 2022 than the 2012 forecast; this reflects a gain of 15,676 students over the next six years.
