The Butts Heartland site just celebrated the successful conclusion of the **Heartland Entrepreneurial Leaders Program apprenticeship**. Five Heartland students are finalizing their Business and Technology coursework that is the foundation of HELP and all 5 students experienced an excellent paid opportunity working with small businesses in Butts County.

This program was developed In partnership with local employers who need students interested in business, marketing, technology programs, customer service and other entrepreneurial opportunities. Students received CTAE credit for the Introuction to Business and Technology and Work-Based Learning credits for their internship. In addition to instruction that included Microsoft office products, introduction to accounting and business along with a focus on social media, Heartland Work-Based Learning and Business and Technology instructor Randall Wilder assisted students with understanding important employability skills—all needed for their successful apprenticeship interviews and experience.

HELP Student Spotlight: Tanner Padgett



Tanner Padgett accepted a great intern opportunity with Construction Materials Management in Jackson, GA. This company specializes in Geotechnical Engineering and Evaluations, Environmental Phase I and II Site Studies, Materials Testing of Concrete, Asphalt, Aggregate, RTT and Soil, Hot Mix Asphalt Design of Superpave, Marshall and P401, On-Site Septic Surveys and System Design, Materials Mix Designs of Roller Compacted Concrete and Pavement Reclamation, NPDES/ Stormwater Monitoring and Inspections. They provided Tanner with the opportunity to learn about extractions of concrete and asphalt for testing purposes as well as training in welding and the introduction to site preparation, pavement reclamation, and stormwater monitoring.

Tanner notes that "The Heartland Entrepreneurial Leaders Program was something new to me and the Foothills School environment.
